The sales since January 1 amount to 72,842,900 pounds, against 49,859,900 for the corresponding time last year.

TAXES ALL THEIR CARS Tennessee Legislature Imposes Ad Valorem Duty on Various Companies'

Leased Rolling Stock.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., April 17.—The legislature today passed the following bills: Ceding a strip of territory twenty miles long along the North Carolina line, excepting mineral lands, to the United States government, as part of an Apalachian forest reserve, imposing an ad valorem tax on all cars owned by corporations other than railroads, affecting the Pullman, Standard Oil, Fruit Dispatch, Refrigerator and all corporations owning or leasing their cars, inflicting a penalty of 25 per cent on all 43. inflicting a penalty of 25 per cent on all insurance companies that fail to promptly 30. pay losses within sixty days after they oc-cur, provided the assured is forced to litigate his claim and is allowed to substantlate it in the courts.
