In the first six innings of yesterday afternoon's game George Tebau's aggression of all-star sluggers descended upon Pitcher Reust for a total of twelve hits of all kinds and sizes and descriptions. He walked over to Reust, the pitcher, and advised him to clear around to third and told him his arm was mighty bad and advised him to rest it up a bit. Then Eddie Gordon was called from the bench and the tide stemmed in a measure.

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DEFENDER IS SMART ENOUGH

Manager Duncan Pleased with Constitution's Behavior on Trial.

CHALLENGER SOMETHING OF A PUZZLE

Old Shamrock Beats It in with Apparently No Good Reason, as the New One Has the Speed.

Bristol, R. I., May 21.—Up and down Narragansett bay today the cup defender, Constitution, was put through his first paces and acquitted itself, as Mr. Duncan, the manager, said, most satisfactorily. Starting out this forenoon in a dying out-wearily breeze, it showed the excellent ability which it had shown in the afternoon. The south-easter sent it scudding about the bay in a lively fashion, with little fuss and scarcely any feathering bow under the smooth bow or in its clean wake.

Every point of sailing was tried. It was hauled against the wind, thrown about half a dozen times, given a good broad reach and finally sent home before the wind with boom off to port, and at no time did it act listless or show any lack of speed.

It was a builder's trial and continued entirely in the afternoon. The challenger, below Bristol harbor, no attempt being made to show the yacht off to the Newport colony, but merely to give the designer a chance to see that it was all that he meant it to be, and in every respect it equalled his expectations.

The yacht has not been turned over to the owners, as there is still some light work to be done on some of the rigging and inside. It is probable that it will formally be placed in commission at Newport late in the month, while the analysis of the boat is that it is well balanced and well rigged, but its sails need improvement. As to speed, it is too early to draw any conclusion.

Shamrock II is a Mystery. RYDE, Isle of Wight, May 21.—The trial of the Shamrock II today was a puzzle in many respects the most puzzling that has yet taken place. Instead of throwing additional light on the abilities of the challenger, today's race makes it more difficult than ever to estimate its speed.

On the whole, the Shamrock II today they had an interesting struggle under full racing canvas, with the skipper at the helm. Officially racing has not commenced, but the skipper were apparently having a trial between themselves and snatching every advantage. Shamrock II was a good half mile behind the seaward when they started, but in the five miles between the anchorage and the Slikker it closed up the whole of this big gap. After threatening to go through the weather, Shamrock II had to be thrown in the wind and all back, while Captain Wringe sailed Shamrock I boldly across his bows in the wrong tack. The keenness of the contest was shown by the fact that Captain Wringe tried this bluff, for had Captain Sycamore held on, he would probably have secured a clear run collision.

Losses on Every Tack. For the first five miles of the official course the new yacht did equally well, opening out on every board and then suddenly falling off, instead of gaining. The new yacht lost on every tack. The explanation given by those on board is that the bobstay weakened and spilled the headsails and foresails, but it is strange if an imperceptible difference in the trim of its sails made so much difference in its sailing.

However, the old boat turned the weather mark nearly three minutes and went down the wind at a great pace. Then came another surprise, for the challenger, which had never before been able to run it, closed up all the time, and when they finished at Nab lightship the minutes were: Shamrock I, two minutes and twenty seconds; Shamrock II, two hours, eleven minutes and nineteen seconds.

The opinion of most of the experts who witnessed the race was that had it been desired that Shamrock II should win it could easily have done so.


