





Denies Suicide Report. An afternoon paper having intimated that former Governor Tanner had committed sulcide, Dr. Dixon stated late tonight that to refute that statement he desired to state positively that although he was unable to state the absolute and real cause of death, he would unhesitatingly say that death was due to natural causes. his opinion being that the governor's death was due to cerebral blood clot, or rupture of a blood vessel of the brain. When former Governor Tanner returned from Chicago his eyes were badly congested and a specialist was called. The congestion became so severe that a blood vessel in the left eye burst. The governor had frequently expressed fear that his rheumatism would have fatal results.


