REJECTS MINORITY REPORT

Presbyterian General Assembly Takes Another Step Toward Revision.
RISING VOTE SHOWS 271 AGAINST 234
Revisionists Cheer Heartily and Would Act on Majority Report if Unrestrained by Moderator Minton.

PHILADELPHIA, May 25.—The Presbyterian general assembly today took another step toward revising the confession of faith by rejecting the minority report, which had been offered as a substitute amendment for the majority report. The vote was 271 to 234. The recommendation is as follows:
"We recommend that a committee be instructed to prepare a brief summary of the reformed faith, bearing the same relation to the confession which the same catholicism bears to the larger catholicism, and to the general model of the consensus creed prepared for the general assembly of 1852, or the Articles of Faith of the Presbyterian church of England, both of which are appended to the committee's report and submitted to the assembly to be referred to the committee appointed."

Moffett Promises a Plan.
After the announcement of the vote, Rev. Dr. G. Moffett informed the assembly that on Monday he would present an amendment with the object of uniting the commissioners in order that a unanimous recommendation might be sent to the presbyteries.
Rev. Dr. Herlick Johnson presented a logical amendment favoring the retention of the recommendation, analyzing the confession of faith demonstrating the necessity for changes in certain clauses and showing the benefits to be derived therefrom. Numerous doubtful commissioners were brought over to the ranks of the revisionists by Dr. Johnson's address.
An effort was made to postpone the vote until Monday, but the commissioners were impatient and insisted on the putting of the question. The moderator was unable to decide by a viva voce vote and a division being called for, a rising vote was taken. When the result was announced the revisionists cheered heartily and called for a vote on the adoption of the majority report. On the advice of Moderator Minton, however, it was decided to postpone consideration of this important matter until Monday.

MUSTN'T WED WIFE'S SISTER

Man Who Does So Violates Rule of the United Presbyterian Church.

DES MOINES, May 25.—The United Presbyterian general assembly of North America devoted two more hours today to the discussion as to whether the creed shall be changed to admit members of secret societies to the church. Two amendments to the revision report were offered and referred to the committee on judiciary. The judiciary committee will present a report on the two amendments Monday. The committee on bills and overtures made a partial report recommending:
First—That the overture to repeal that part of section 4, chapter xiv, of the Confession of Faith which reads: "The man may not marry any of his wife's kindred nearer in blood than he may his own, nor the woman of her husband's kindred nearer in blood than her own," be received, a clear constitutional majority of the votes of the church and is therefore carried.
Second—That the assembly hereby ratifies the discussion of the presbyteries and decides that the portion of section 4, of chapter xiv, of the Confession of Faith that was in accordance with the whole number of votes cast was 1,192, of which 772 were affirmative.
The judiciary committee made a recommendation on woman suffrage that, inasmuch as the request relates to the civil status of woman, it is not deemed expedient that an ecclesiastical court shall take action.

MORE WARRANTS FOR SIEGEL

Receiver Swears Out Another for Commission Man's Embezzlement Total Now Reported \$145,486.94.

KANSAS CITY, May 25.—Uley Wedge, receiver of the Siegel-Sanders Live Stock Commission company, of which Frank Rockefeller is the principal shareholder, has made an affidavit before a justice of the peace of this city charging Frank Siegel, late president of the company, with embezzling a total of \$145,486.94 of the company's money.
Receiver Wedge in his affidavit gives the various dates on which the embezzlements were made and the amounts involved in each transaction. The receiver has sworn out another warrant for Siegel's arrest.

Francis Keppler's Hooded Brick.
When the auditorium bricks were auctioned off at the Elias' minstrel show some bricks were taken to the principal shareholder, No. 12, which finally fell to the ownership of Francis Keppler, the little dancer. This brick has been handed over to the gold by a Council Bluffs jeweler and studded with thirteen opals, and is the handsomest hooded brick ever worn by an actress. A. C. Stephan will forward the brick to Rochester, N. Y., where the little dancer will be this week. Along with it will go brick No. 142, which will be worn by Mrs. Stephan.

Fights Five Policemen.
Thomas Sullivan, 323 South Eleventh street, at closing time last night and fought five policemen. He was arrested after him. Four other policemen were required to subdue him, and night sticks had to be used. Several scalp wounds on Sullivan's head were attended by Police Surgeon Ames.

Donn Wins Nebraska Meet.
YORK, Neb., May 25.—Donn college won a majority of the votes of the intercollegiate athletic meet today. The University of Nebraska was second, Wesleyan university third and York college fourth. One record was broken, Kellogg of the University of Nebraska, in the pole vault by leaping 39 feet 2 inches.

Exchange Wiggs and Stefani.
St. JOSEPH, Mo., May 25.—Manager McKibben of the St. Joseph team has effected a trade with Des Moines whereby Pitcher Wiggs is preferred for Stefani. The latter came from San Francisco, but has little opportunity in the Western league of showing what is in him.

INSURANCE FRAUD GROWING

Prosecution Claims to Have Discovered Still Other Intended Victims in Defenbach Case.

CHICAGO, Ill., May 25.—One of the greatest conspiracies to defraud insurance companies ever recorded was disclosed in the Defenbach case today. Not \$12,000, as the indictment charges, but \$47,000 were the stakes being played for, according to the prosecution.
Following are the companies and fraternal societies in question and the amounts of policies: Equitable Life Insurance company, \$10,000; Mutual Life Insurance company, \$10,000; Security Life and Trust company, \$10,000; Prudential Life Insurance company, \$10,000; Metropolitan Life Insurance company, \$10,000; New York Life Insurance company, \$10,000; Independent Order of Foresters, Canadian branch, \$5,000; Knights and Ladies of Honor, \$2,000; total, \$47,000.
Insurance policies obtained upon the life of Marc A. Defenbach, deceased, upon which were based the indictments returned charging conspiracy to defraud, naming Dr. August M. Unger, Francis Vayland Brown, Frank H. Smiley and Marc A. Defenbach as defendants, are as follows: Independent Order of Foresters, Canadian branch, \$5,000; New York Life Insurance company, \$5,000; Knights and Ladies of Honor, \$2,000.

WILL ROOT FOR EIGHT HOURS

Supreme Grand League of America is Born in Minneapolis as Labor's Ally.

MINNEAPOLIS, May 25.—The Times tomorrow will say: Articles of incorporation of the Supreme Grand League of America, an organization devoted to the advancement of the eight-hour movement, have been filed in the office of the secretary of state.
Its officers are: President, John O'Donnell, state labor commissioner; vice president, M. F. Neary, president of the State Federation of Labor; secretary, G. L. Rockwell; treasurer, M. N. Rogers. The first lodge will be formed in Minneapolis, St. Paul, Duluth and Winona. From Minneapolis the movement will spread to neighboring states.

STRIKERS OUT AND IN AGAIN

President O'Connell Reports They Stand 24,000 to 52,000, Which Makes Him Hopeful.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., May 25.—President James O'Connell of the International Association of Machinists, who was here today, said that 24,000 machinists are on strike throughout the country, while 52,000 have returned to work. This equals the total number of machinists in the organization, 76,000. President O'Connell predicts an early settlement with all the manufacturers.

Mistees' Blouse Shirt Waist, No. 3619, Misses' Five-gored Skirt, No. 3587—No matter how many dainty gowns a girl may possess she is certain to feel the need of just such a serviceable one as the illustration shows. The original is of Russian blue serge with bands of black velvet ribbon and shield of cream lace over white, but dark blue is admirable for outdoor sports, white serge is charming for afternoon wear and galates, duck, linen, madras and the like are in every way suited to the design.

The waist is cut with a seamless back and full fronts, which extend below the skirt to regulation length. The fronts are attached to a shallow pointed yoke beneath the sailor collar. The collar is seamed to the neck and fronts and the shield, to which the stock is attached, is sewed on the right side of the bodice, and placed at the left beneath the collar. The fullness of the back is drawn down in the center at the waist line, that of the fronts being arranged to give a slightly bloused effect. The sleeves are two-seamed and terminate in becoming points over the hands.

The skirt is cut in the gored, with a circular flounce at the lower edge, but can be left plain if preferred. The upper portion fits smoothly over the hips and can be arranged in an inverted plait or gathered at the back if desired.
To cut the gown for a miss of 14 years of age 7 1/2 yards of material 27 inches wide, 7 1/2 yards 32 inches wide, or 4 1/2 yards 44 inches wide will be required, with 1/2 yard of all-over lace 18 inches wide for shield and stock collar; to cut waist alone 2 1/2 yards 27 inches wide, 2 yards 32 inches wide, or 1 1/2 yards 44 inches wide; to cut the skirt alone 5 1/2 yards 27 inches wide, 5 1/2 yards 32 inches wide, or 3 1/2 yards 44 inches wide.

The waist pattern, No. 3619, is cut in sizes for misses of 12, 14 and 16 years of age.
The skirt pattern, No. 3587, is cut in sizes for misses of 12, 14 and 16 years of age.
