Results. BOSTON, June 6 .- The committee of arrangement for the jubilee Young Men's Christian association convention, June 11 to 16, made public today the annual report of the national committee, R. C. Morse, New York, secretary. In substance, it was

as follows:

The work in the Philippines has produced excellent results, winning the confidence and esteem of civil officers as well as those of the army and navy.

In co-operation with the provincial committee of Ontario and Quebec, three representatives were sent with the detachments of Canadian troops serving in South Africa. At Cavite, P. I., the authorities have granted the use of a building and this has been fitted up by the committee and a very heipful work is being prosecuted.

In the last two years the number of railroad associations has increased from 157 to 161. There are 615 student associations. The work of the husiness department committee has greatly enlarged, and the number of donors has increased from 2,669 to 60,000. Organizations now extend from the northern border of Mexico to Skagway and Cape Nome, above the arctic circle.

The colored men's department enters upon its work in the new century with cighty-three associations, sixty-two of which are among students and twenty-one among cities.

The statement of the treasurer shows that the receipts during the last fiscal year were \$136,839 for home work; publication account, \$21,207; foreign work, \$28,200. The number of men in the work officially is 1,522. as follows:
