### USE DYNAMITE ON CHURCH

#### Unknown Parties Attempt to Blow Up Edifice at Manhattan.

#### BELIEVED TO BE DONE BY JOINTISTS

#### Methodist Minister, Elected Mayor, Causes Saloon Keeper to Be Fined and Sentenced to Sixty Days in Jail.

MANHATTAN, Kan., June 22.—An attempt was made at 2:30 this morning to blow up the First Methodist church with dynamite. It is believed to be the work of jointists who directed their spite against Rev. J. M. Miller, pastor of the church, because of his crusade against saloons. No arrests have been made.

A powerful explosive was thrown upon the door of the main entrance, blowing a large hole in the door, shattering the steps and breaking a number of stained glass windows. The damage will amount to several hundred dollars. The paragon adjoining was not injured. Rev. Miller was elected mayor this spring and has waged a bitter fight on the joints. Last Thursday six jointists were fined \$200 each and sentenced to sixty days in jail, their conviction being secured on evidence worked up by the minister.

#### SUPPLY PASTORS WILL FILL PULPITS

#### Omaha Will Not Be Neglected in a Spiritual Way and But Few Churches Will Suspend Services.

There will not be the suspension of church services this summer that there was last, and it is doubtful if any of the churches will close entirely even while their pastors are taking their vacations. While many of the churches will suspend services for a few weeks during the warm weather, the majority are still undecided as to the time or place, but nearly all will arrange for supplies for their pulpits during their absence. All of the Catholic churches will continue their services as usual.

Rev. C. S. Sargent of St. Mary's Avenue Congregational church will spend the summer in New England, dividing his time between the mountains and the larger cities. While in Springfield, Mass., he will be the pulpit of the First Congregational church and later will address congregations in Boston and Hartford, Conn. During his absence St. Mary's Avenue church will continue the morning services, supplied by various ministers.

Rev. Hubert C. Herring will spend the latter part of July and August at Boulder, Col., during which time the pulpit of the First Congregational church will be filled by different ministers.

Rev. Diffebacher of Irvington Congregational church will take no vacation. Rev. Edward F. Trefz will spend July and August with his family at Lake Okoboji, returning to the city Saturday evening to conduct the regular Sunday morning services.
