Open Program Proves Profitable to Favorites-Horses at Top of Betting Take Three of Four Events Scheduled.

Four first-class races were held at the Twentieth street and Ames avenue track yesterday afternoon and from the standpoint of merit the opening of the five days' meet being held by the Omaha Jockey club was a success in every particular. Excellent speed, the hottest of competition and honest racing throughout were there from the first moment. The attendance was small, not more than 300 spectators being present. Despite this, the management is not discouraged and will carry the meet through to the end on the same thorough scale.

The thinly-sprinkled grandstand in no way dampered the ardor of horses or riders. In each race every horse that started was right in the bunch, none being left behind and every event was run for blood. The good time made is proof of this. The track was a trifle lumpy, but very good for running horses and the mile finished in 1:45. Enthusiasm was at all times very great and a row of carriages peopled with gayly-dressed women along the stretch fence made it appear that the crowd was much larger than it really

The third race brought out the prettiest play of the day, after a long delay at the post in an attempt to get the horses started. Both previous events had gone off at the very first trial, but this time there was trouble. It was only for four and a half furlongs, and two of the jockeys eapecially showed a strenuous desire to get the best start if possible. So it was impossible for a long time to get Madam ishop, a favorite at even money, and Lew H, a 3 to 1 shot, back to the mark. Time and again they were worked back, but would always spring away before they had lined up with the other two.

Meanwhile Joe Foster, another favorite, and Jim Hicks, a little brown gelding quoted at 2 to 1, were remaining comparatively still, while the others were wearing themselves out. When the start was finally made Jim Hicks took the pole and the lead and pulled it out all the way around after a sensational tussle in the ast eighth with Joe Foster. But Jim was ridden by a little boy, Doty, and from that fact resulted efreumstances which lost them the race. The horse was billed to carry 121 pounds, and Doty weighed seventy-five. The rest was made up at weighing in with a heavy roll of blankets carried in front of the saddle. These were soaked in water to make them heavy enough and three pounds extra was put on to make sure.

However, when Doty came to weigh out after it was all over he was three and a half pounds shirt. During the long worry and wait at the post six and a half pounds of water had evaporated and Jim Hicks was disqualified after winning a handy race, the victim of using water instead of lead on so hot a day. He had run a heartrending race, too, but Joe Foster, who finished second, was then advanced to first, and the Madam took third. The money was \$150 and the time 0:57%.

Five Horses Run Mile.

The last event was the popular one, being for one mile, with a purse of \$200. Five norses started and Robert Bonner won in the stretch. He was the prime favorite, being started even, and held out of the betting entirely the last little while before the race. The rest of the running was done by Balk Line at 2 to 1 and Lord Howard at 21/2 to 1. They led Robert Bonner a great chase till the last quarter, when he came up and won by half a length. The other two named tied for a division of second and third moneys. Prairie King, sired by Hindoo, and quoted at 3 to 2, was whipping all along the line Jockey Cottrell pushed him along with the bunch, a trailer.
