SARATOGA, N. Y., July 11.—Harry Mann, theatrical manager of New York, died here today of Bright's disease. The name Harry Mann was assumed by Emanuel Hayman when he went into the theatrical business. He was a brother of Al and Alf Hayman, both of whom are theatrical managers. He was born in Wheeling, W. Va., November 17, 1859, and was educated at Northeastern college. He had managed a number of leading playhouses, among them the Madison Square, Fourteenth street and the Knickerbocker of New York and the Columbia of Brooklyn and California and the Baldwin of San Francisco.

DETROIT, July 11.—General H. M. Duffield received a cablegram today from Justice H. B. Brown of the federal supreme court announcing the death of Mrs. Brown in Italy. The cablegram was dated Rome, in that country.

Isaac Julyan.

PLATTSBROUGH, Neb., July 11.—(Special)—Isaac Julyan, 70 years of age, died suddenly at his home in this city today of apoplexy. He had been working in the Burlington shops here for fifteen years. He leaves a wife and four children, one son being Tom Julyan, foreman of the Burlington roundhouse at Gibson.

Ex-Congressman Martin.

MARION, Ind., July 11.—Ex-Congressman A. N. Martin, democrat, died in the hospital at the Soldiers' home here today of consumption. He represented this district in the national house of representatives for three terms—1880, 1880 and 1882—during which time he was chairman of the committee on pensions. He was 60 years old.

URBAN POPULATION GROWS

Nebraska and Iowa Have a City Census of More Than Twenty Per Cent of Their Total.

WASHINGTON, July 11.—The census office issued a bulletin today concerning the urban population of the country. It shows that 28,115,000 people in the United States live in cities and towns of over 4,000 population. This is 37.3 per cent of the entire population, a gain of almost 5 per cent since the census of 1890, when the percentage was 32.9.
