



HOLD THE NON-UNION JAPS Vancouver's Organized Fishermen Carry Prisoners of War to an

Island for Safe Keeping.

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 12.-The developments in the Fraser river strike situation during the last twenty-four hours have been startling. The union fishermen have now the upper hand. As a result of a battle of small boats out on the gulf, a battle in which many shots were exchanged, but in which no combatant was killed, sixteen Japanese were taken prisoners by the strikers. The Japanese boats were overturned, the rifles and fishing gear of the Orientals thrown into the water and the Japanese themselves taken to one of the small islands far out in the gulf. actly where this island is located is a secret of the white fishermen, for they chose it several weeks ago for occasions such as this. They say they will continue to maroon nonunion Japanese there for the remainder of the season, or until the place is discovered by the authorities. All that is known is that the island is between here and Nanaimo, fifty miles away, and that it is hard to find. The Japanese will be given food every few days and made comfortable, although closely guarded, until a settlement is reached or until their island prison is located by the authorities. Two provincial constables were out in Japanese boats today and effected the arrest of six white fishermen. These are charged with molesting Japanese and their cases will be heard tomorrow. A shot was fired from another boat at the time of the arrest and the arrested men themseives tried to bluff the constables at the time of the arrest by firing in the air. No one was hurt by the shooting.

The Japanese held a big meeting at Steveston and raised by voluntary subscriptions \$4,000 for a Japanese hospital, which they think may be needed, and then discussed the salmon-catching situation.
