A distinguished house party will follow, several of the most prominent persons present remaining until the end of the week. Among the features of the fete will be a recital upon the celebrated organ in the Long library, boating upon the lake and rendering of band music during the entire day.

The duke of Marlborough said to a representative of the Associated Press "No significance is attached to this fete, so far as I am concerned. I did something similar five years ago, only on a much smaller scale. I thought this would be a good time for the unionist party to effectively prove its cohesion and the concord which prevails in the party and also give the leaders a chance of personally thanking their agents and workers; so I asked them all to come to Blenheim."

AFFAIRS IN THE FAR EAST Diplomatic Corps at Pekin Consider

ing Russian Proposal for Eventual Tariff Increase.

WASHINGTON, July 19 .- Commissioner Rockhill has provided the State department by cable with the present status of the ne-

gotiations at Pekin: "Diplomatic corps at Pekin is engaged in considering the Russian proposals for the eventual increase of the tariff (maritime customs). A solution of the problem is hoped for. The indemnity fixed at 450,000,-000 tacks and 4 per cent interest has been formally accepted and Japan has waived preferential treatment. The formal surrender of Pekin to the Chinese authorities is expected to take place August 14."

The date mentioned is the anniversary of the relief of the legationers by the international forces. The Russian proposal referred to is understood in substance to be an increase from 5 per cent to 10 per cent of customs duties which the Chinese government may collect from imports from for-eign countries. It is further understood that this increase is not to take effect at once and perhaps not at all. It will depend upon the resources of China under the existing system. This proposition is believed to be much less objectionable to Great Britain and Japen, as well as to the United States than the original proposition to make an absolute and immediate increase of the customs duties to the extent proposed.

SHANGHAI, July 19.-Prince Chun brother of the emperor of China, who goes to Berlin to express the Chinese emperor's formal regret for the death of Baron von Ketteler, the German minister, today received a deputation of British and American Protestant missionaries, who wished hun a safe journey. Norway Adopts Erhardt System. BERLIN, July 19 .- Norway has adopted the Erhardt system of artillery and has ordered twenty-two complete batteries from Germany.
