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MURDERED ON THE PRAIRIE

MAY BE RESULT OF SECTIONAL FEUD

WILLIAMS NICHOLS, SON OF WYOMING RANCHMAN, FOUND DEAD

Millers Have Been Enemies in Range Matters and Both Families Have Gone Armed—Open War May Result.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., July 19.—(Special Telegram.) William Nichols, son of P. Nichols, a prosperous ranchman of Iron Mountain, fifty miles north of Cheyenne, was found dead on the prairie near his home today. The boy was murdered and the authorities are searching for the murderer. The Nichols and Miller families have been engaged in a feud over range matters a number of years. Numerous duels have been fought and the warring factions have gone armed to the teeth, but this is the first actual bloodshed since the trouble began. It is charged that the Millers are responsible for the death of Nichols and should this prove true it will precipitate a determined war between the two families.

STORE BURNED NEAR EUSTIS

J. W. Moore Finds Rifed Money Drawer and Jewelry Case in a Canyon.

EUSTIS, Neb., July 19.—(Special Telegram.) J. W. Moore's store, twelve miles south, burned down about midnight last night. The fire is supposed to be of incendiary origin. Moore was sleeping in the building and escaped with but scanty apparel. He stated that he was robbed and that he found his money drawer and jewelry case, rifled of the contents, in a nearby canyon. There is \$500 loss; insurance, \$400.
