Eat but Little Food. Dr. Frederick J. Wearne-Of course if one feels dizzy he should at once lie down in the shade and rest, no matter where he is. One may not experience any such warning, however, as dizziness. He may be walking along the street feeling perfeetly well and fail over all at once. One should eat very little during this kind of weather, especially of heavy food, and after eating. Very little food is needed when it is so hot. Drink should be taken bath in the morning with water right from the hydrant. One should not come home Any evening the same people can be seen perspiring from his work and jump right well should be sponged off frequently with tepid water. > Dr. M. J. Ford-Well cooked vegetables and ripe fruit should be eaten in abundance during the extremely hot weather. Cereals are also healthful in hot weather, but fat meat should be avoided. Lean meat may be eaten in moderation. Alcoholic drinks are dangerous in this sort of weather. It is very difficult for an habitual user of liquor to recover from sunstroke. Great care should be taken in the treatment of heat. There is a great difference between heat exhaustion and sunstroke. In sunstroke the face becomes flushed the temperature runs far above normal, the heart action is rapid. Few people recover from sunstroke. Persons thus stricken should have ice baths and should have ice packs put on the head. Care must be taken, however, not to force the patient's temperature below 102. There is danger of forcing the temperature below normal heat. Heat exhaustion demands a very different treatment. It is frequently taken for sunstroke, but is much less serious. Patients turn cold when they are exhausted. face becomes white and the heart action is rapid but feeble.

Take Care of the Stomach.

Dr. J. P. Lord-Above all keep the tomach in good order by proper diet, which seans light farinaceous food, with little or no meat. Eggs are all right, and so is milk if it is germ proof. The great trouble with animal food is that it is so likely to be contaminated. It is almost impossible get it from its source to the consumer without contamination. Liquor is Dangerous.

Dr. W. O. Henry-The use of alcohol is dangerous in hot weather for the reason that it increases the rapidity of the action of the heart and forces the blood to the head, two things to be avoided in this kind of weather, as this is the effect of heat, also. The best preventive action is to let sloohel alone; don't live too high; keep as quiet as possible. If one is prostrated lay the patient in a horizontal position, elevate the head, apply cold applications to the head and spine.

Dr. Charles Rosewater-The moderate use of alcoholic stimulants has little or no effect upon the average man with reference to his liability to heat prostration. The immoderate or long continued use has an ill effect, as it tends to reduce the elasticity of the blood vessels. The best way to prevent heat prostration is to keep the bowels open, do no heavy work and take no violent as to require stimulants, and in another exercise immediately after meals. Dr. S. J. Quinby-To prevent heat prostration don't drink whisky, avoid all alcoholic stimulants, sleep as much at night as possible In your meals keep away from meat, let your diet be vegetable. Bathe at least once a day and do not ever-exercise. In case of prostration avoid the use of alcoholic stimulants. The chance of many patients for recovery have been lost through the injudicious administration of alcohol. The best remedy to use is a heart stimulant and the best one is glonomine. There persons who have been overcome by the are two forms of heat prostration. One case requires the application of cold water. the other the application of hot water. If the patient is too hot he should be taken into the fresh air and cold water liberally applied.

Do Not Worry.

Dr. E. E. Womersley-Alcohol certainly makes one more susceptible to the heat. It is not high temperatures which cause heat prostrations, but combinations of high temperatures and relative humidity. Therefore, we can stand more bot weather in this part of the country than in many others. Fretting is one of the principal causes of heat prostration. The person who continually complaining about the weather is far more liable to suffer than the one who accepts the inevitable and makes the best of it. To place one in a position of least liability to prostration it s necessary to avoid all indulgence in alcoholic liquor; avoid too much cold drink; do not drink when overheated.

Avoid alcoholic liquors of all kinds should be the first rule during the heated term. General moderation in food, in drink and in exposure is also of great importance. brasks and in Colorado and Wyoming and OPINION IN EDMINSON CASE On the Burlington there was .05 of an Judge Munger Rules in Litigation Wherein Beatrice Water Works Bonds Are Involved.

In the United States circuit court Judge Munger has filed an opinion in the case of John W. Edminson against the City of Beatrice. In his opinion the court renders judgment against the defendant for an amount of mency due on two sets of water works bonds, the amount of which is not yet determined.

The point involved was the liability of must recite the act under which they are issued. The first series of bonds recited that the city was operated under a law governing cities of more than 5,000 and less than 25,000, when in fact it was operated under a law governing cities of more than 1,500 inhabitants. The court held that the false recital does not invalidate the bonds. In regard to the second series it was contended that the amount of this issue was in excess of the amount permitted to be issued by statute, that the statutory limitation is not as binding as a constitutional limitation, as it may be removed by the legislature, and that as a creature of the legislature the city is estopped from setting up as a defense the fact that the bonds were an over-issue in the face of the recital in the bonds to a contrary effect.

This demand has been larger dur ing the last two weeks, veterans in the produce market say, than ever before in the history of the business in Philadelphia have been shipped in the last fortnight from this city to points in Ohio, Indiana and Illinois and to the section lying southerly from these states in the Mississippi valley.
