Corn closed ¼c and oats ¾c higher for September delivery. Provisions closed 7½c lower to 5c higher. September wheat was sold freely at the beginning of the sestion because yesterday's frost scare proved to have been practically unfounded and beto have been practically unfounded and be-cause the pool cables were easy. September opened %24c lower at 719714c. The corn strength started a buying movement of fair proportions and during the first hour the market ascended to 714c. The fact that only eight loads were taken for foreign shipments, lighter seaboard clearances and continuity cross reports. shipments, lighter seaboard clearances and optimistic crop reports from the spring wheat country later combined to create bearishness and September in consequence declined to 70½c and closed easy. 150 %c under yesterday at 70½c. Seaboard clearances were \$50,000 bushels, while primary receipts aggregated \$55,000 bushels, compared with \$11.000 bushels last year. Minneapolis and Duluth reported 151 cars, against 150 last week and 253 a year ago.
