ELKES LIVES A FAST HOUR

New York Rider Breaks Eighteen Records Winning Middle Distance Championship at Buffalo.

BUFFALO, Aug. 15.—Every seat in the spacious stadium was filled with spectators when the international grand circuit races of the National Cycling association began. At times hundreds were standing or sitting

of the National Cycling association began. At times hundreds were standing or sitting on the upper railings and in the aisles. Fully 15,000 of the exposition crowd witnessed the races.

The card was a good one, including the finals of the one mile, 2:10 class professional, the Pan-American circuit one-mile championship professional, the half-mile handleap professional and an hour's contest between Harry D. Eikes of Giens Falls, Educard Taylore of Parls and Ray Duer of Buffailo for the one-hour exposition invitation middle-distance championship and a purse of \$1,000. The race became a procession after the fifth mile, for Eikes had both men at a safe distance, having lapped the Frenchman four times and Duer once.

It was a beautiful exhibition of pacemaking by Eikes, however, and he broke the records for every mile from the second up to and including the nineteenth. Eikes then let up and at the end of the hour he had covered is miles 16s yards, which is about one mile behind the record. Duer finished second, three miles behind the second man.
