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REDMOND IN FIGHTING HUMOR

Nationalist Leader Summons London Paper to Reveal the Commons.

GOOD ABUSE OF PRIVILEGES IS ALLEGED

Editorial is Cited in Which Evening Globe Compares Nationalist Methods with Those of Tammany Hall.

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LONDON, Aug. 15.-The House of Commons today on the motion of John Redmond, the Irish nationalist leader, ordered the editor and publisher of the Globe (servative) and evening paper of London, to appear at the bar of the House tomorrow afternoon for gross breach of privileges of the House in accusing the nationalist leader of corruption in connection with private bill legislation.

The Globe editorial to which exception is taken said:

"The same spirit and the same motives which have made Tammany the synonym for political obliquity have made the nationalist party what it is. Many connected with it are the very ruck of the population, whose sole object is to make as much money by political jobbery and corruption as they can. Anyone who has had connection with Irish private bills, corporation contracts and franchises across the water can bear ample testimony to this."

The Globe, hearing of Mr. Redmond's proposed action, attempted to explain that it had not meant any imputation on members of the House of Commons, "but upon the wirepullers and parasites who have made politics in Ireland a profession, as their kinsmen have done in New York."

Honor of House is Concerned.

Mr. Redmond, in calling attention to this "very degrading and scandalous libel" said the libel concerned the House of Commons as a whole far more than the Irish members. The latter had not complained of the violent, rancorous attack of Mr. Chamberlain at Bismarck which they knew him of in connection with Irish politics, and had not complained of the gross breach of personal corruption was a different matter and the House ought to vindicate its own honor. He moved that the House declare the Globe's article to be a gross breach of the privileges of the House.

Mr. Balfour, the next proposed speaker, concurred. He said there could not be the smallest doubt that a breach of privilege of the gravest character had been committed. He could not imagine an accusation more unjustifiable. At the same time, in regard to the wirepullers and parasites who have held that the House could not commit a greater folly than to enter into a controversy with the press.

Mr. Asquith, Liberal, and Mr. Healy, nationalist, supported Mr. Redmond, whose motion was adopted unanimously.

Mr. Redmond adopted the motion that the editor and publisher of the Globe be ordered to appear at the bar of the house tomorrow afternoon. The motion was carried unanimously.

SULTAN TAKES HIS VENGEANCE

Army of Exiles is Sent to Arabia to Aton for Blaze at Harem in the Yildiz Palace.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 15.-Seven hundred and four exiled persons, many of them being women, started for Yemen, Arabia, August 14. The prisoners include those who were implicated in the recent fire at the harem of the Yildiz palace.

AMSTERDAM STORY OF PRIVATEERING

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 15.-The official Handelsblad, while incredulous regarding the Matin's story that an attempt is being made to persuade Kruger to sign a document authorizing the capture of the British steamer, warns the Boer leaders that "no civilized power could approve of the adoption by the republic of a medieval system of warfare like privateering."

BRISK FIGHTING AT PANAMA

Rebels Are Gradually Closing in on Colon.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Aug. 15.-The British steamer, which had been captured from Colon and brings reports of heavy fighting Monday on the outskirts of Panama and Colón. The rebels were steadily advancing on the towns proper. A large number of men had been wounded.

A large number of the wounded men belonging to the government troops were taken to Colón Monday. This is regarded as an indication of the persistency of the rebel attacks. The converted cruiser Namouna has been found practically useless, owing to the bungling attempts to mount heavy guns on her.

The Darlen brought forty passengers who were obliged to leave Colón in order to escape the danger and to avoid conscription. The British consul at Colón has entered a protest against Jamaicans being conscripted by the Colombian government to fight against the rebels.

The passengers of the Darlen say the chances of the liberals' success seems better than ever since the commencement of the revolution. Guards are still kept on the trains running between Panama and Colón.

Both sides are committing atrocities. In the attack made on the government troops Saturday a few miles out of Colón the rebels defeated the government forces and one of the latter was afterward found shot in the abdomen with both legs amputated. This was a reprisal for the torture by the government of political prisoners.

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
