

SLOUP IN HIS OWN DEFENSE Another Chapter in the Controversy Over Superintendency of State Hatchery.

OMAHA, Aug. 19 .- To the Editor of The Bee: In the issue of The Bee of August 16 there appeared an arricle headed "Repairing Sloup's Damage." This article does me an injustice, as I am accused of being responsible for a state of affairs for which am not to blame, and which existed long before I became the incumbent of the office of superintendent of the fish hatcheries. I know the animus which prompted the writer to pen the article mentioned, and that is to boost O'Brien's waning reputation, for they see the handwriting on the wall and in order to create a favorable impression in the minds of the public in regard to O'Brien, this and several other articles have been published. I care nothing about the controversy brought about by O'Brien's appointment. It is none of my business and politically I rather like the idea of having a democrat appointed by a republican governor, as I am a democrat myself, but when they attempt to repair his reputation at the expense of mine; when they try to make me the scapegoat for a condition of affairs caused by O'Brien's neglect and incompetency, I feel called upon, in justice to myself, to register a vigorous
