

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 24 .- (Special Telegram.)--Umpire Tyndall declared the game forfeited to the Blues in the last half of the tepth inning this afternoon when the score was 2 to 2. I am not demanding that salaries be raised; what I object to is the lowering of salaries under such conditions as I have mentioned."
