ELEVEN KNOWN TO BE DEAD

Search for Others Being Kept Up in the Wreck of Burned Steamer.

AUTHORITIES INVESTIGATE DISASTER

Statement Made that Two Steamers Were Hauling-Engineer States Too Much Steam Was Being Carried.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 29.—Eleven known dead, nine missing and thirty-two injured is the record of the explosion of the boilers of the steamboat City of Trenton, on the Delaware river yesterday afternoon. All night long city firemen, policemen and officials and employees of the Wilmington Steamboat company, which owned the life-raft, worked in and around the burned and blackened hull searching for bodies of victims of the disaster, believed to be either in the vessel or in the water. Hundreds of men are dragging the river and will continue to do so until every part of that was on the boat is accounted for. Of the eleven bodies recovered ten have been identified. The identified dead are: JOHN P. CHIEW of Camden, N. J., a steamboat engineer of the City of Trenton. MISS ELIZABETH GREEN of Philadelphia, crushed to death. WILLIAM DUNN of Philadelphia, a passenger. ARTHUR LANSING, 14 years of age, Trenton, N. J. JAMES O'CONNELL, fireman, Philadelphia. MOTT MABLE, fireman, Philadelphia. AUGUST MABLE, deck hand, Philadelphia. WILLIAM H. KEENE, passenger, Philadelphia. JAMES M'ORMICK, Wilmington, Del., passenger. WILLIAM NELSON, 69 years old, of Hampton, Va. The unidentified body is so badly burned that its sex cannot be determined.

According to the statement of the widow of the dead assistant engineer, John P. Chiew, the man had a presentation of death. Mrs. Chiew says that before leaving home for work on Tuesday night her husband said: "Lizzie, I may never see you again. I have a presentiment that there will be an explosion on the boat. If there is there will be no escape for me. They are running at too high a steam pressure and if an accident should occur I and many others will be killed."

Of the thirty-two injured persons taken to the hospital attached to the Philadelphia House of Correction, all are reported as doing well today and it is not now believed that any of them will die. August Reinhardt, an expert machinist employed by the Needle and Loom Shiplubbing company, builder of the City of Trenton, recently overhauled the boat's boilers. He said today that there is no doubt in his mind that the explosion was due to the exhaustion of the boiler after in the boiler. He gave it as his opinion that the boat was being run too fast and this exhausted the water.

The boat was fifteen minutes late when it left the wharf yesterday afternoon and it is stated that much of this lost time had been made up when the explosion occurred.

Deny Story of Racing. The captain and other officers of the boat and the officials of the company deny emphatically the statement that the City of Trenton was racing with the steamer Twilight of the opposition line when the explosion occurred. The Twilight and the City of Trenton were close together at the moment of the explosion, the former being in the lead. Those on board the Twilight did not hear the explosion or know of the mishap to the rival boat until too late to be of assistance.

Seven in the history of the Delaware river has there been such keen rivalry between lines of river steamers as during this season. On the lower parts of the river races have been of daily occurrence. Only a few weeks ago the crew of the Trenton steamer Phoenix were rescued by Coroner Dugan for falling to go to the assistance of some persons who were drowning. At the time the Phoenix was racing with the Twilight, the boat that led the City of Trenton when the explosion occurred.

Superintendent of Police Quirk declared today that the matter will be thoroughly investigated by his department and if the charge of racing is sustained the officers and crew of the wrecked steamer will be arrested.

In addition two or more Trenton people are reported missing. It is believed that the body so badly charred is that of Mrs. John Matthews of Philadelphia.

Captain Workman of the City of Trenton insisted today that his boat was not racing. The bodies at the morgue which had been identified as James Graham of Trenton, N. J., was that of William Nelson, aged 67 years.

Mrs. Josephine Torrey and her son, Earl, of this city, who were reported missing, have been located. They were on the deck of the City of Trenton when the explosion occurred. They climbed down the side of the boat into a rowboat and were taken to Tacony, Pa., whence they came to Trenton.

TRENTON, N. J., Aug. 29.—Miss Ethel Stokes, 14 years old, of Overbrook avenue, this city, is the only Trenton person so far as is known, who was on the City of Trenton, and who is known to be missing. Her relatives fear she is dead.

A score or more of persons were reported missing last night, but inquiry at 11 tr homes today developed the fact that they came home on other boats. Mrs. H. Torrey of Trenton and her son, Earl, were reported from Philadelphia to have been seen on the boat before the explosion. Their names do not appear in the city directory and they do not live at the address given.

Information was received today from Philadelphia that Miss Jessie Stratton, the Trenton school teacher, who it was thought might die from the injuries she received in the explosion, is in much more favorable condition and the doctors expect her to recover. It was thought at first that Miss Stratton had inhaled flames and her case was therefore, pronounced hopeless.

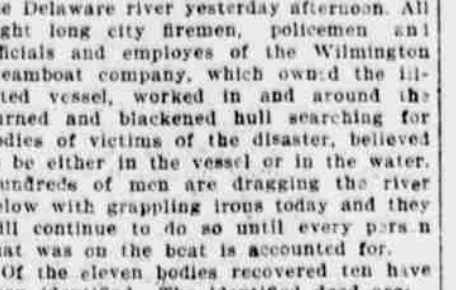
