Published figures indicate that the crowds have been increasing as the senson has progressed, but there was a time when the big league clubs were playing before crowds whose admission fees would not pay for the balls used up in the course of a game Such facts are sure to make the magnates think and it is a reasonable presumption that the fall and winter sessions of the owners will have more to do with how to correct the mistakes of the last assaum than with laying plans for any more war In our own little league there are signs of discontent. "Golf is like many more games. A good player may have a particular style or form of his own but if he has learned the game in his youth, he learned the true form first and then when he became proficient adopted a style of his own. Give me a man with the long back swing with the driver and the clear 'follow through' and I will bet you golf balls to marbles that he is a good player.

## Hard Work is Futile.

"New clubs are starting up all over the country and, if the players are not prop-erly instructed in the art of using clubs for different tees, the time will be when we will have more poor players than good often with the wrong club, is not golf and tends to demoralize the player. To play properly one has to have intelligence in the use of club, a good eye and nerve. He must not only be able to play the long game, but must be able to get out of difficulties quickly and without undue penalty. If he makes a poor stroke he must have the power of discernment to understand what the trouble is and be able to avoid the same grief in the future.

"Why is it that some players have no trouble in placing the ball in a straight line with the hole on a short or long approach shot while another player will slice and pull the ball to all eternit; simply because the first doesn't follow through and is thinking more about distance than direction.

"One swallow never made a summer, i true, and it is equally true that a good drive from the tee never won a match. Accurate even play is so essential to the winning of a game that the player who falls to make good approach shots can never expect to win out. A player should judge distance with care, follow through wel and half the battle is won. Then in putting there are so many who fall down on the reen that all their former good play is nullified, and the hole lost.

"I am a great believer in the straight pendulum motion of the putter while playng either an approach put or putting for the hole. Get the head of the club directly behind the ball and follow through without any cut or pull, and the stroke will tell. This circular motion with the putter before striking the ball is a losing game.

## Distance Not Sole Factor.

"What I should like to see in new players is a more constant endeavor to play carefully, accurately and in good form. rather than an effort to go after the ball with the one object in view-distance. It certainly is a fine, exhilerating sensation to see the "gulty" fly straight through the air 225 or 230 yards, but how many can drive eighteen times as the crow flies Practice makes perfection, and it should be remembered that golfers are not made in a day, and I have a feeling deep down somewhere that the real thing is a born

"What we should all do is to get to gether and assist our neighbors who are, perhaps, our 'golphic' inferiors, and let them try to emulate the best there is in the game. The youngsters growing up around us are the material from which the best players are made, and if we allow them to run wild, they will surely be like an unweeded garden grown to seed, and we will forever regret that our boys or our girls were not trained up in the way they ought to have played. But on the other hand, if careful coaching, combined with intelligence on the part of the player, produces something good, then we can look back with pride at our handiwork."
