CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—Emma Goldman, the anarchist agitator, under whose red banner Leon Czolgosz claims to have fired his bullet into the president's back...

Miss Goldman arrived here Sunday from St. Louis. Her immunity from arrest while in the Missouri metropolis and up to today in Chicago after her arrest in Cleveland...

For a moment she became a woman and a child. In a moment, however, this exhibition of distress was over and when she put her foot on the step to mount into the carriage she was again Emma Goldman...

"I am not Miss Goldman," said a Swedish woman who was with her. "I am Lena Larson," an anarchist, endeavoring to imitate a Swedish dialect.

"All right, I speak Swedish myself," said the police officer as he poured out a few questions in the Norse tongue.

Tells Where She Has Been. During the talk which followed Miss Goldman detailed her best and worst movements since last July. She went from Chicago to Buffalo, accompanied by Miss Isaska, the daughter of the alleged anarchist editor under arrest here...

LATEST BULLETIN FROM THE BEDSIDE

MILBURN HOUSE, BUFFALO, Sept. 10.—The following bulletin was issued by the president's physicians at 10:30 p. m.:

The condition of the president is unchanged in all important respects. His temperature is 100.6; pulse, 114; respiration, 28.

When the operation was done on Friday it was noted that the bullet had carried with it a short distance beneath the skin a fragment of the president's coat. This foreign material was, of course, removed, but a slight irritation of the tissues was produced, the evidence of which has appeared only tonight.

BULLETINS OF PHYSICIANS

They Agree that President McKinley's Condition is Eminently Satisfactory.

BUFFALO, Sept. 10.—The following bulletin was issued by the president's physicians at 9 a. m.:

The president's condition this morning is eminently satisfactory. His pulse is 100; temperature, 100.6; respiration, 28. There is no change since this morning's favorable bulletin. Pulse, 110; temperature, 100; respiration, 28.

MILBURN HOUSE, BUFFALO, Sept. 10.—The house is very quiet tonight. There are few callers. The president is said to be resting comfortably.

MILBURN HOUSE, BUFFALO, Sept. 10.—It was 11:20 o'clock tonight when the physicians emerged from the house. They had been in consultation an hour and fifty minutes and announced to the waiting newspaper men that the president's condition was unchanged in every way.

The length of the consultation had created some uneasiness and this was somewhat increased when it was learned that Dr. McBurney, who had intended to leave for Stockholm, Conn., at 11:15 p. m., had to miss his train and would remain over until tomorrow.

THANKSGIVING DAY AT FAIR

Reports of Another Operation Alarm Watchers Around Milburn House.

DOCTORS SAY IT IS NOTHING SERIOUS

Few Wound Stitches Removed to Believe Very Slight Irritation.

CONSEQUENCES NOTHING TO WORRY OVER

Patient Virtually Certain Speedily to Regain Good Health.

FRIENDS AND RELATIVES LEAVE BUFFALO

Patient Doing So Well that Neither His People Nor Government Officials Deem It Necessary to Stay Longer.

MILBURN HOUSE, BUFFALO, Sept. 10.—Late tonight there was a slight scare at the Milburn residence, caused by the protracted visit of the consulting physicians, who remained almost two hours, and this was increased by the announcement in the official bulletin, issued at midnight, that a slight irritation of the exterior wound, discovered only tonight, had necessitated the opening of a few stitches of the wound.

As stated in the bulletin, which all the doctors signed, this irritation was attributed to the fact that a small fragment of the president's coat had been carried into the body by the bullet and although this foreign substance was removed, a slight disturbance developed which made necessary the opening of the wound.

The doctors seek to allay all apprehension by the positive statement that this incident cannot give rise to other complications and their frankness in giving the news to the public leaves no room for doubt as to their entire good faith.

Nothing Like Blood Poisoning.

But the most positive assurance were given that the only effect might be to delay slightly the healing of the wound. It was not in any way the result even of a suggestion of blood poisoning.

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"Of course, we will all feel easier when a week has passed," said Dr. McBurney, the dean of the corps of physicians who today committed themselves without reservation to the opinion that their patient was out of danger and that only the possibility of complications threatened his life.

Each of them, with the exception of Dr. Rixey, who did not leave the Milburn residence, placed himself squarely on record, not privately to the friends of the president, but publicly through the agency of the press, that the danger point had passed and that the president would survive the attempt upon his life.

Not Concerned About Bullet.

The little piece of lead in the muscles of the back is giving the physicians no concern whatever. Unless it should prove troublesome to the president later on, he will probably carry this grim souvenir of the assassin's bullet to the end of his days.

The doctors say that once encysted it can do no harm. The X-ray machine is ready for instant use, however, and if there is the slightest inflammation or pain in the vicinity of the bullet an operation will be performed.

The vice president, members of the cabinet, Senator Hanna and the other distinguished friends of the president who have remained here to await the issue accepted by the president's physicians today are practically conclusive and there was an exodus of those who considered their presence no longer necessary.

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
