Incipient Insurrection in Island is Being Dealt With Summarily. CHAFFEE WILL TEACH NATIVES A LESSON

WAR DEPARTMENT BRINGS OUT MAPS

Will Acquaint All Forces with Topography of the Belligerent Isle in That Campaign May Be Pushed Intelligently.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—Last advice from the Philippines indicate that the military authorities intend to take prompt and vigorous measures for the suppression of the insurrection in the island of Samar, and that attention will be directed to the summary punishment of the treacherous natives who took part in the massacre of Company C, Ninth Infantry, at Balanigta. There is, therefore, every prospect that the island of Samar will be the theater of active hostilities for some time to come.

SHOT DEAD IN HIS PARLOR

Detective Montgomery of Santa Fe Road Assassinated at Winfield, Kan. WINFIELD, Kan., Oct. 5.—Detective Montgomery of the Santa Fe road, one of the oldest men in the secret service of the road, was assassinated tonight by an unknown man who drove up to his house in a buggy and shot him with a rifle. Montgomery was in his parlor. The assassin escaped and left no clue. No definite cause is known for the shooting, but it is supposed to have been the result of Montgomery's energy in hunting down men who were alleged to be stealing from the railroad company.
