

TIGERS ARE DRIVEN TO COVER

Prairie Dogs Chase Their Striped Opponents All Over the Field.

DOANE IS OUTCLASSED BY NEBRASKA

Preachers from Crete Put Up Game Fight, but Captain Westover's Team Makes Score Twenty-Nine to Naught.

LINCOLN, Neb., Oct. 5.—(Special Telegram.)—In a one-sided game the University of Nebraska foot ball team was victorious this afternoon over the Doane college team of Crete. Twenty and fifteen-minute periods were played, resulting in a score of 29 to 0. The players had a strong team, but owing to their inexperience they were outclassed at all points in the game. The Nebraskans appeared in good form and played rapidly and effectively throughout. Two substitutes were tried in the line and two sets of backs were used. On defensive play the Nebraska team showed marked improvement and so far as could be judged the only one in the entire contest did the Doane team gain distance on downs. The ball was continually in Doane's territory, excepting when driven back by punting, and never was there any serious danger of the Nebraska line being crossed. Cortyoun at right end and Pillsbury at full back in the first half made spectacular plays, the former in tacking and the latter in gaining ground. George Shedd showed up in his oldtime form, but was taken out at the end of the first half, owing to a slight injury.

For Doane the playing of Carlson and Wendland was especially noticeable. Captain Westover won the toss and chose the north goal, with a slight wind at his back. Nebraska kicked off for twenty-five yards. Doane's fullback was downed in his tracks by Cortyoun. Fuller hit center for two yards and Pillsbury for ten. The next play Doane fumbled and Shedd fell on the ball.

Nebraska now began a procession down the field. Kingsbury plunged through right tackle for five yards and Pillsbury the same place for ten. Kingsbury and Shedd tackled Carlson so hard he dropped the ball. Cortyoun started for the goal with the ball, but was downed by the line of the Tigers. The Nebraska backs rushed the ball down over the goal line with two or three Tigers hanging on his back. The crowd yelled, causing Stricker to miss goal. Time, four minutes. Score, 10-0.

Doane kicked off thirty-five yards and Drain returned it for ten. Kingsbury next play. Halfback Shedd sprained his ankle and was replaced by Bender. Kingsbury got the snafu move and lost the ball on a fumble.

Doane tried their opponents' line but the light Tiger backs could not bring with Nebraska's forwards. On the third down a place kick was tried. CREIGHTON BESTS BELLEVUE

University Gridiron Athletes Run Up a Score of Thirty-Eleven Points.

EASY WALKAWAY FOR THE HOME ELEVEN

Visitors Outclassed in Weight, Speed and Skill, but Play a Nifty Game. Many Women See the Contest.

Joy reigns in the camp of Creighton. Thirty-seven points was the score which the gridiron athletes of the university rolled up against Bellevue in a foot ball game yesterday afternoon and their adversaries were unable to get even within striking distance of the Creighton goal throughout the contest.

The feature of the crowd which attended the game on the new creation of the field was the generous sprinkling of women. For the first time this fall the fair sex was out in force and their school spirit and loyalty and enthusiasm put the men to shame. Many Bellevue supporters were there and it was altogether an evenly divided swarm that roared like a hurricane between 4 and 8 o'clock, not taking in the fact that others shouting just as loudly for the losing side.

It was in every sense a walkaway for Creighton. The team did not outweigh its opponents to any appreciable extent, not more than fifty pounds in all, but the wearers of the blue sweater with the big white "C" outplayed their antagonists man for man, and the result was an overwhelming victory.

Two halves of twenty-five minutes each was enough for the Creighton boys. That was all the time they needed to make seven touchdowns by straight foot ball, no fakes nor fakes and to kick two goals out of the seven chances. In that one department of the game Creighton is lamentably weak. Captain Welch and "Mike" Thomas, the two ends, and stars both of them, took turn about at the goal work. Every touchdown of the seven was immediately behind the goal, nearly so and that gave them the straight kick which has the full margin of goal width. In spite of that fact they missed five between them and Welch made the two that were scored.

Goal Kicking a Bit Off. That is unfortunate work and though it made no difference in the result of yesterday's contest, in a close game the effect might have been disastrous. Goal kicking is a very important feature of foot ball. Every season is strewn with games lost and won by poor goal kicking and good. Last fall Minnesota defeated Wisconsin because the latter missed a goal and the Badgers were the better team.

In all other departments the Creighton boys were superb and every credit is due Coach Whipple and Captain Welch for the fine working order and snappy play which they have indicated into their men in so short a time. It was a splendid exhibition of action, coupled with the formidable plunging of Butler and the end runs of Thomas and Welch, that won for Creighton.

Meanwhile Bellevue college played a losing but a nifty game. The vanquished men, downgraded and trampled and held for most of the game, but they did not flatter.
