NEW YORK, Oct. 11 .- M. Santos-Dumont. having completed the repairs to his balloon. the Santos-Dumont VI, in spite of unfavorable predictions based on a sudden rise of the barometer, decided yesterday to start against the wind and maneuver around Longehamp race course, says the Paris correspondent of the Herald.
