ECHO OF EXPOSITION CASES

Important Decision in Greater

Another step has been taken in the settlement of the affairs of the Greater America exposition. Judge Dickinson has handed down a decision in the lien cases pending before him, which involved an amount ag-

gregating about \$6,000. The more important claimants were J. R. Lehmer, the Cady Lumber company and Morton & Sons, with several other claimants for smaller amounts. The claim of Mr. Lehmer, aggregating \$3,000, was not allowed as a lier; the claim of the Cady Lumber company, about \$2,000, was allowed as a lien, while the lien claimed by Morton & Sons was allowed in part, \$1,000 being stricken from the amount covered by the lien. The other claims were allowed or disallowed in amounts sufficient to make the aggregate of the liens allowed \$3,000, an

approximately equal amount being disallowed. The decision of these cases has an important bearing on the case of the trusted of the Greater America Exposition com-pany against the Chicago Wrecking com-pany, now pending in the United States circuit court. By the terms of the agreement between the wrecking company and the exposition company the former was to be allowed credit on the purchase price of the buildings for all money paid by it to hold-ers of liens, to attorneys for preserving the title to the buildings in the wrecking company, to persons employed as police officers in preserving the buildings, and for all loss of material. Until the liens were established in the state courts it was impossible for the case in the federal court to be tried. The claim against the wrecking company amounts to \$21,000, subject to the credits mentioned, the exact amount of which cannot be known until the trial of the case, as

some items are contested. It is understood that certain parties in-terested in the lien case before Judge Dickinson have decided to appeal from his decision. If this is done there is no telling when the federal suit will be tried as the issues between the trustee and the holders of liens must be finally determined before

the credits claimed can be allowed and the issues made up before Judge Munger.

It is the intention of the trustee to push the case in the federal court to trial as soon as possible, but the exact method to be followed is not decided upon. T. J. Mahouey. the attorney for the preferred creditors, is out of the city and until his return no steps will be taken, as the trustee will be guide by the advice of the attorney for the labor-
