Four Blocks in Sydney, N. S. HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 19 .- The prosperous perous town of Sydney was almost swept out of existence today by a fierce configration, which started about 2 o'clock. The flames. which were fanned by a forty-five-mile gale, swept through the principal business portion of the town, causing ruin and devsetation. Four blocks of the finest business buildings are in ashes. The fire is supposed to have been started by the bursting of an oil stove. It is impossible to estimate the loss at present, but it is roughly placed at between \$400,000 and \$500,000, of which not more than half is covered by insurance.

Butchins House. Houston HOUSTON, Tex., Oct. 19.-The Hutchins house, a large four-story hotel, was burned at an early hour this morning and it is believed the fire was caused by incendiarism. There were about 300 guests in the house, all of whom escaped in safety and without injury. Many of them lost heavily in property, however, as thieves raided the hotel while the fire was in progress. loss is placed at \$110,000 on the botel and furnishings, with insurance of \$55,000. Tenants occupying the ground floor suffered loss by water amounting to \$15,000, partally covered by insurance. The house was built forty years ago and was one of the best known hotels in the south.

Courthouse at Paris, Texas. PARIS, Ky., Oct. 19 .- The courthouse at this place burned this afternoon. At one time the town was threatened, but the fire was confined to the courthouse. The loss is \$130,000, with \$60,000 insurance.

Olerk of District Court Names Bundreds of Judges and Clerks.

APPOINTMENTS MADE UNDER NEW LAW

Republicans Have Majority of Board: in Precincts Where They Cast Larger Vote Last Year and

Vice Versa-The List.

Judges and clerks for the election to be held on November 5 have been appointed by District Clerk Brondwell. One section of the new law making it the duty of the district court clerk to appoint the election officials provides that there shall be three udges and two clerks for each district, but following section provides for the appointment of two additional judges for each district in cities having the registration system. At first Clerk Broadwell was in doubt as to the legality of the second section and did not know whether to appoint three or five judges for each district in Omaha and South Omaha. After taking legal advice, however, he determined to make the number five.

There are therefore 686 election officials n all in Douglas county, 482 judges and 264 clerks. Under the new law all of the appointees are required to serve, unless excused by the clerk of the court for good reason, or suffer a fine. The judges and clerks were selected from lists furnished to the clerk by the republican and democratic county committees. In precincts where the republicans cast the larger vote at the last election they have been given the majority of the judges, and vice versa The appointees are as follows:

Miss Tebitt Discusses Herbert Putnam's Opinion on Popular Books.

PUBLIC LIBRARIES NOT FOR AMUSEMENT

Novela Which Have but Electing Popularity Should Not Be Supplied at Public Expense, According to idea of Famous Librarian.

"Never buy a book of fiction for a nutilion library until it is at least a year old. Such was the advice which Herbert Putnam, librarian of congress, gave to Miss Edith Tobitt of the Omaha public library and several lows librarians at the meeting

in Burlington a short time ago. Mr. Putnam was one of the chief speakers at the association meeting. He advised so strongly against the purchase of modern fiction that many of his listeners who are in charge of large public libraries consulted him after he had finished speaking and asked for a fuller expression of his opinion concerning the place of recent fiction in a library which is patronized by

persons of all classes. "Mr. Putnam urged that public libraries should not attempt to keep up with recent fiction," said Miss Tobitt in discussing the great librarian's opinions. "He declared that novels of the hour are read only for pleasure and that it is not the province of a public library to amuse the public He even said that persons in charge of public libraries are making a sinful waste of public money when they attempt to supply the demand for some book which

has suddenly leaped into popularity. No Tax for Amusement

"In the opinion of Mr. Putnam, it is not ight to tax the public for anything which has no higher purpose than to afford amusement. He showed that library tax is the only tax which is ever devoted to amusement purposes and contended that such a diversion of funds is unwarranted Parks and other public improvements afford pleasure, but their chief purpose is to contribute to the health and comfort of the public. Much current fiction, in Mr. Putnam's opinion, cannot be considered as literature and is intended only for amuse

"While he was in charge of the Boston public library Mr. Putnam received 706 books of fiction annually for inspection and rarely ever admitted more than 175 of these to the shelves of the library. It would hardly be possible for a western public library to be as conservative in the purchase of new fiction. Western people are very anxious to read all that is new and expect a public library to supply their needs. This makes it necessary to hay many copies of popular books. In some cases these are used but little six months after they are purchased.

"Mr. Putnem urges that all fiction can be traced to a few of the great masterpieces. He insists that when a library offers its patrons the great classics in fiction it is doing all that can be expected and all that is desirable. The public has no right, in his opinion, to demand books which are the fast of the hour.

"It was the opinion of many of the lows ibrarians that Mr. Putnam's views were rather radical and that it would not be wall to go to such extremes in selecting books for a large public library. Still, I think that all persons who heard Mr. Putnam were convinced that public libraries have catered too much to readers of fic
