

Milwankee Making Special Arrangements for the Bandling of Fruit

OMAHA IS TO HAVE ONE OF THE BUILDINGS

Designed to Handle Train Loads at a Time in Even Temperature, No. Matter What the Weather Conditions.

The Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul has naugurated an improved method of caring for fruit shipments in cold weather. Terminal fruit warehouses are to be built at the important terminal stations on the Milwaukee road, Omaha included. These houses will be designed for the exclusive storage of fruit in cold weather. The accommodations will permit the handling of entire trains under cover and in an even temperature, regardless of outside condi-

The first of these fruit houses has been finished in Milwaukee and work on a second will soon be started in Minneapolis. of them will also be built in Omaha, but probably not until next year. The houses will all be of brick and well lighted. The roofs will be of the truss pattern and driveways will be made along each track. The average accommodations of each station will be for twenty-five cars, six on each of the paralleling tracks. By an improved arrangement of switches a locomotive arriving with an entire train of fruit can place the same in the buildings in a

short time. Facilities for the shipment, receipt and storage of fruit is the least organized branch of western roads. Overcrowding of great markets and distributing centers one day and lack of shipments the next has been the experience. It is to remedy this condition that the new houses are to be

Officers of this and other railroads believe that more fruit would be consumed in Omaha, Milwaukee, Minneapolis, Sioux City, Dubuque, Duluth and other cities of that class if there were facilities for keeping the fruit in palatable condition.

Protective Bureau Limited.

The much-heralded protective bureau, formed by the railroads of the country to detect and prosecute ticket manipulators, seems destined to early abandonment by reason of legal opinions just given defining the very limited powers it may exercise. Attorneys for the Great Western and other lines have thrown a wet blanket on the scheme by saying that such a bureau would have no standing in any court as a prosecutor for any individual road, on the ground that it would not be the authorized agen! of the road; in other words, that it would not be the railroad's case if carried on by

an outside bureau.

The protective bureau was formed at the convention of the general passenger agents in Buffalo a year ago. The chairmen of the five passenger associations of the country-Trunk Line, Southeastern, Central, Western, Southwestern and Transcontinental-were named to organize and carry on the work of detecting and prosecuting forgers and manipulators of transportation. This committee reported an organization at the passenger agents' convention just closed in Asheville, N. C.

It now develops that officers of a number of the more important roads are opposed to turning over their legal departments to the new bureau, on the ground that any case it might bring would fail.

Chicago Great Western Equipment. The Chicago Great Western has placed another order for locomotives, making the

three months. The order placed includes three extra heavy passenger locomotives of the prairie type, to be used on the limited trains on the eastern division; twelve extra heavy fast freight engines, also of the Prairie type, and five switch engines, which will be heavier than any the company now operate. The twenty locomotives are to be

finished at the earliest possible moment. Two weeks ago the Great Western oriered twenty-one heavy locomotives and shortly before that another twenty machines were ordered, making a total order of sixty-one extra heavy engines within a few months.

General Manager E. Dickinson of the Union Pacific is in St. Louis attending the semi-annual meeting of the American Railway association More than 150 members are present from Canada, Mexico and the United States, representing 190,294 miles of railroad. Many important matters in connection with the railroad business will ome up for consideration, including uniform train rules, standard dimensions of box cars and car service regulations.

Q. F. Campbell, assistant rate clerk of the Union Pacific; G. H. Cramer, chief rate clerk of the Burlington, and Louis Storck, chief rate clerk of the Elkhorn, are at-tending the meeting of rate clerks of the Western Passenger association now in session in St. Louis. The matter under consideration is the revision of the military and tourist rates. The San Francisco and eastern military rates have been changed to conform to the late rulings of the government. The all-year tourist tariff, in connection with steamship rates, will also be revised. Forty clerks are present, representing sixty-five lines. Andrew Steven-son, chief rate clerk of the Western Passenger association, is in charge of the proeedings.
