## ANOTHER OPINION OF PEARSE

#### What an Educational Journal Said About Him More Than Two Years Ago.

OMAHA, Oct. 31.—To the Editor of The Bee: As our judgment of Mr. Pearse may be warped by local conditions, I wish to respectfully call the attention of The Bee to the opinion entertained elsewhere of the \$200 payment he accepted from the American Book company. The enclosed is from the March, 1899, issue of the Educational Forum, an educational journal published in Chicago:

"Omaha, Neb.: A school director of Omaha recently preferred written charges against members of the board and the superintendent in connection with the adop-tion of books of the American Book company. The board decided that it could not safely ignore the charges, and resolved to have them investigated. In order that an impartial jury might be had it appointed an investigating committee from its own number. After hearing the evidence and getting the sworn testimony of an agent of the American Book company that he had never bribed any member of the board, this com-mittee sat on the case and brought in a verdict exonerating themselves and all the board before the world. During the investigation it was brought out that Superintend-ent Pearse was paid \$200 by the American Book company to write a Nebraska state preface to their geographies. He thereupon recommended the adoption of these books in the schools at a much higher price than the new Rand & McNally geographies, which many competent judges pronounce the best. There may be those so pessimistic as to suggest that if Mr. Pearse were still in Beatrice his services in writing a Nebraska preface would not have commanded any such figure, and that the \$200 was in reality money paid him for his influence in intro-ducing the books into Omaha. But the higher criticism of a more generous age will easily recognize in this transaction the tendency of the times, on the part of publishers, to seek in new fields for literary talent and reward it with bountiful hand. It presages a period when publishers will see the great importance, to the rising generation, of a special edition of each book, edited by men whose knowledge of the subject is only eclipsed by their ability to bring the school public to properly appreciate and pay handsomely for their efforts and the efforts of the enterprising and magnanimous publish-
