## TURN OF BASE BALL WHEEL

It Brings About Several Important Changes in Big Leagues.

JIMMY MANNING OUT OF WASHINGTON

Tem Loftus Takes Management of Capital Team and Frank Selec Comes West from Boston to Take Chicago Remnants.

Only one turn was given the base ball wheel last week, but that one caused several revolutions. It may cause more before the situation is entirely clear. Jimmy Manning has left the American league, his interest in the Washington team to be transferred to Fred Pastal of Detroit. Differences of opinion as to the policy of the league, said to exist between Mr. Manning and Mr. Johnson, the president, are ascribed as the reason for the transfer. Not a great deal of surprise has been expressed, nor has the change been debated very extensively as yet, probably because foot ball has been taking up the sporting writers' space. Several lines of speculation are opened by the deal, however. Those of us who know Jimmy Manning well know him for a shrewd business man and a most capable base ball manager. When he followed the fortunes of the American league from Kansas City to Washington it was the general supposition that he had a better thing in a team at the national capital.

During the whole life of the American league Mr. Manning held a franchise and was one of the leading members of the controlling coterie. That he was in line with President Johnson's policy a year ago, when the era of expansion set in, is shown by the fact that he was on the circuit committee with Comiskey and Johnson. These men fixed the present circuit, disposing of the franchises, arranging for ownership and all the details of the new teams, and certainly they must have worked in harmony at that time. Therefore, the serious differences as to policy have developed during the last season's playing. What these may be can only be guessed at in absence of a full statement from the parties concerned. One difference might be ascribed to the announced intention of the American to further invade the territory of the National and the necessary alterations in the circuit. This invasion, as now understood, contemplates the planting of the Milwaukee team in St. Louis and the Baltimore team in New York.

One would hardly think that Mr. Manning's views would in a short year undergo the radical change necessary to consider the aggressions suggested an insuperable obstacle to his longer maintaining business relations with Mr. Johnson. This ought to effectually dispose of this hypothesis What seems the more likely reason for Mr. Manning's retirement is but an echo of a suspicion that kept cropping out all through the last summer, that the actual paid admissions to the American league games were far below the figures announced from the box office. No one who knows Jimmy Manning will suspect him of letting go of a good thing just because he doesn't happen to be in line with one of his business associates. The most reasonable conclusion is that Washington didn't provide the exsected bonanza and that the whole outlook for the American league lacks the reseate bue that would encourage a canny man to remain in the game. In the meantime President Hickey resolutely declines to make public the averages of the Western league players for the last season. His idea is to prevent the big league magnates from getting a line on the performances of the players of the Western. Some of the big league managers may be as innocent as our president thinks. but it's a safe bet that they know all they want to know about the Western leaguers and that the official averages of last season will have very little weight in making up the decisions as to engagements. One thing is quite certain. Omaha fans needn't worry about any of Pa Rourke's brigade being kidnaped by either the National or the We're safe that far, anyhow.

It is just within the range of probabilities that Jimmy Manning's action in leaving Washington may have a decided effect on the destinies of the Western. If he should return to Kansas City and Tebeau should go back to Denver, a move not altogether unlikely, we would have both cities greatly strengthened. A good man at Colorado Springs and Minneapolis will then put the circuit in good condition. There is no particular objection to be urged against Mr. Beall. He gave Minneapolis the best team he could, spent his money freely and did all he could to afford first-class ball, but the people didn't appear to like him, and that is all there is to it. Out at the Springs the conditions are somewhat different. Billy Hulen managed to make himself unpopulat with public and players alike. He not only had trouble with his partners in the team, but with other managers in the league as well. 
