Southwest Association Elects F. E. Palmer of Villisca President.

NOTABLE MEN MAKE MEETING SUCCESSFUL

Program of the Sessions is One of the Best Ever Provided - Bit of Fun Creeps in Through Resolution on Philippine Excursion.

What was considered to be the most successful meeting ever held by the Southwestern Iowa Teachers' association closed yesterday noon and by evening the 500 visiting teachers had started for their homes. Not only was the attendance at the meeting this year larger than ever before, but the program provided for the general session was a record-breaker.

The selection of the meeting place for next year was left with the executive committee to decide.

The association adopted resolutions expressing its appreciation of the courtesy of the Board of Education in permitting the use of the High school auditorium for the sessions and extending its thanks to all who had taken part in the program and assisted in making the meeting the success it was.

A bit of humor was injected into the last session by President Hussie of the Western Normal college at Shenandoah who hereby memorialized the executive committee.

Other things being equal, but believing that since so many of our teachers enroute last summer to our new possessions acquired new possessions even before reaching Honolulu; believing since this event being that all teachers should be kindly affectionate, warm-hearted and united;

Resolved, That we, the members of the Southwestern Iowa Teachers' association, do hereby memorialize the executive committee of the National Educational association to hold the next meeting of that body in the Philippines, and we promise our heartfelt interest in such meeting, proper steamship passage be afforded for all, with the customary stop at Honolulu.

In offering the resolution, which was received with laughter by the male members and with blushes by the young women teachers, President Hussie said that owing to certain entanglements he would not be able to go.

The program of the closing session was an address to the teachers by Hon. R. C. Barrett of Des Moines, state superintendent of public instruction, and a lecture by Dr. Arnold Tompkins of Chicago on "The Education as a Universal Element in Education."

Superintendent Barrett in his address did not take any particular topic, but spoke of a number of subjects of interest to the teachers.

EARL OF CROMER'S BRIDE

Notably Fashionable is the Wedding of This Actual Ruler of England.

(Copyright, 1901, by Press Publishing Co.) LONDON, Nov. 2.—(New York World Telegram—Special Telegram.)—The earl of Cromer, for eighteen years the actual ruler of England under the modest title of British agent and consul general, goes back to his post with a bride, a sister of the marquis of Bath.

The wedding was a notably fashionable affair and the reception, given by the dowager marchioness of Bath was attended by, among others, the marchioness of Bath, Lady Castleross, Lady Kenmare and Lady Margaret Douglas, the marchioness of Hastings, Lord Revelstoke, Lady Sarah Spencer, Lady Thynne, Lady Suffield, Lady Antrim, the marchioness of Blandford, Lord and Lady Carrington, the dowager marchioness of Headford, Lord and Lady Baring, Lord Granville, the American charge d'affaires and Miss White, Lady Cranborne, the marquis of Northampton and Lord Cork.

The gifts included one from King Edward to the earl of Cromer, consisting of a silver inkstand in an oak case, engraved with the Cromer crest, and the inscription: "Evelyn, Earl Cromer, on his marriage, from Edward R. and L. October, 1901."

The bridegroom's gifts to the bride were a massive single stone diamond necklace, a splendid diamond tiara, a gold pin with "K" in diamonds, and a diamond pendant with a large pearl in the center. The dowager marchioness of Bath gave the bride a gold-mounted dressing case with monogram and coronet; the marchioness of Bath, a massive diamond ornament with drop; Lady Cranborne and Lady Thynne, a diamond serpent with ruby eyes; Lady Ashburn, a diamond and ruby pin and diamond pendant; Countess Gleichen, a green enamel pearl brooch; the dowager marchioness of Bath, Lord and Lady De Vesci, Lady Beville, Trilby, Lord Thynne, Lady Shaw Stewart and Shaw Stewart, a magnificent diamond necklace; the marchioness of Blandford, a gold, diamond and ruby cloak fastener; the duchess of Somerset, an engraved gold box, and the marquis and marchioness of Lansdowne, three silver tea caddies in case.

Miss Lillian McCarthy was being awarded the palm of being the most beautiful bride upon the English stage. Frederick Harrison has pronounced the verdict and no one has come forward to openly challenge it. Miss McCarthy is Wilton Barrett's leading lady in Australia.

CORDIAL WORDS TO AND FRO

United States Delegates Refuse to Be Outdone in Courtesy.

DAVIS DECLINES PRESIDENCY OF CONGRESS

Washington Government Does Not Send Place Hunters to Mexico, but Only Seeks to Promote Better Understanding.

MEXICO, Nov. 2.—At this morning's meeting of the Pan-American congress General Rafael Reyes, delegate from Colombia, in a speech full of praise for the United States, proposed that H. C. Davis, chairman of the United States delegation, be elected permanent president of the Pan-American conference. In supporting ex-Senator Davis as permanent president General Reyes said: "In offering the proposition which has just been read I feel sure that I have interpreted the wishes and sentiments of all the delegations of Latin America. In tendering the office of the president of the congress to the chairman of the United States delegation we are performing an act of courtesy in assigning the place of honor to the chief representative of the nation which has taken so important a part in convening both Pan-American conferences and which, if on no other ground than that of language, figures among all Latin American nations here represented in the role of a guest."

When General Reyes had named Mr. Davis for the presidency of the conference C. M. Pepper, a United States delegate, spoke in Spanish declining the honor. Ex-Senator Davis then spoke in person, thanking General Reyes and the congress, saying the Americans are not here for place, but to increase the general feeling of amity and goodwill among the nations; that his delegation wanted no more territory and stood by the Monroe doctrine and for the preservation of the commercial rights of the republics.

Ex-Senator Davis having declined the presidency of the conference, the provisional president, Generoso Riquelme, chairman of the Mexican delegation, was elected president of the International American congress. Durate Pereira of Brazil was elected first vice president and Baliezar Esturpation of Salvador second vice president.

Senor Carbo of Ecuador proposed naming Secretary Hay as an additional honorary president. Senor Calvo of Costa Rica seconded the motion and Senor Correa of Nicaragua asked that the appointment be made by acclamation, and after another speech by General Reyes the meeting accepted Senor Carbo's proposition unanimously.

Colombia Does Not Respond.

At the morning session General Gil Fortoul said he had received no word that General Castro had complied with the resolution with respect to the war between his country and Colombia and he asked the president of the conference if a reply had been received from Colombia.

The latter said that the reply of Venezuela had been received, but up to the present moment no reply had been received from Colombia. Gil Fortoul said he thought diplomatic usage demanded that no official record of the reply of Venezuela be made until the reply of Colombia should be received. He therefore asked the chair to withhold the reply of Venezuela until Colombia should be heard from.

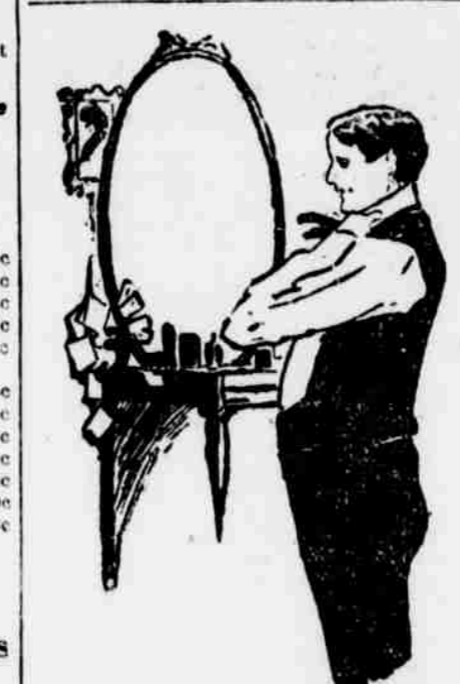

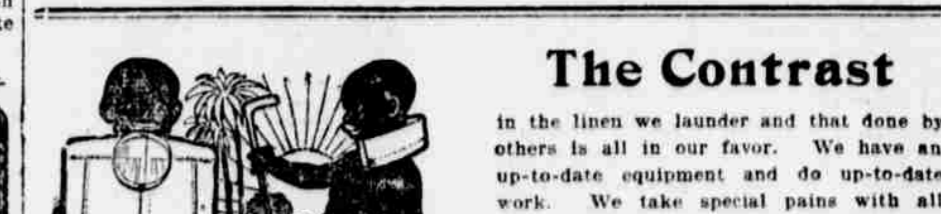
