

FOOT BALL FOR NEXT SEASON

Nebraska's Prospects on the Gridiron Are Bright Indeed.

LOOKS LIKE A CHAMPIONSHIP ELEVEN

Old Men Back and Booth to Coach, No That the Cornhuskers Will Likely Lead the Western List.

Despite the popular fear to the contrary, it is probable that the University of Nebraska will have a very strong foot ball team next year.

Tradition, too, militates strongly against the hope that Nebraska will keep up the pace another season, but it is likely that the enemy to success will also be overthrown when next year's candidates are rounded up for duty about the first of September.

This is a logical result, when analyzed. For instance, when the game begins in a school team of eleven men is gotten together, they do not shine to any extent.

But about the fourth year the men begin to graduate and leave school and this is fatal to the team's standard of work.

At Nebraska this rule has held good to a remarkable degree. The last few years of play illustrate this. In 1891 the team was only fair. In 1892 and 1893 it was good.

That shows what experience and the continuation of team play will do. In 1900 the men lettered their 1899 form so greatly that they defeated every opponent save Minnesota, against whom they scored more points than did any other team during the season.

Shortly after that Nebraska began to round into condition. Recovering from an unfortunate and unusually numerous series of accidents to its men the team grew very strong and has been on the uphill slant since that time.

What has caused the fear for the strength of next year's team is the fact that seven of the regular men on the eleven graduated the coming spring.

For quarterback, again, McDonald of this year's second eleven will undoubtedly be used. He has played this important place on the second team all year and has shown up wonderfully well.

At present does not intend to desert Nebraska, even for Wisconsin. The reason is this. He has just one season more in which to coach, after which he will begin the practice of law in the east.

Wisconsin does not seem to offer this opportunity. Booth is half inclined to believe that Nebraska will be better than any of them next year, so he has probably stayed with the Cornhuskers.

Every influence is being brought to bear on Booth to induce him to stay, and that is one reason why so many graduates are promising to return and stay in school during the foot ball season, at least.

And in addition to that there are Cuff and Bender for additional first-team backs and Moloney and Voss for first eleven linemen.

Wisconsin University would now seem to have demonstrated with considerable clearness that it is the real champion of middle west foot ball this season.

The result of the Chicago games with Michigan and Wisconsin were a great surprise. These contests were looked forward to by the rivals for the championship as of supreme importance in determining their relative status.

It was merely a question of which team could make the biggest score against Chicago, the heavy Wolverines, with their peculiar mixture of open work and close formations.

That made it look as though Michigan was not very strong, as Chicago was thought to be weak, and Wisconsin hopes rose. They fell again on November 23, however, when Michigan defeated Beloit 39 to 0, more than twice the score Wisconsin had made against the school early in the season on October 12.

So it meant a good deal to both rivals when the Badgers faced Chicago Thursday and defeated the Maroons by 35 to 0. The Chicago lineup was practically the same and the Maroons were if anything better than they had been twelve days previous.

It is just possible that this superiority in Wisconsin's showing against the Maroons may result in that event which is longed for by every enthusiast in the west, a post-season game between the two.

In the east Cornell has finished a most successful season by defeating the University of Pennsylvania, 24 to 6. In this contest a member of the Blue, a young fellow named Cornell, who had been playing on the gridiron all of his life, was the hero.

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PUGILISTS AND WRESTLERS

Omaha Likely to See Some Good Bouts During the Winter.

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SHOOTING RUNS OUT EARLY

Omaha Hunters Find Game Very Scarce and Hard to Get At.

The season of elm shooting has come early for Omaha hunters this year. Neither in land nor water fowl was the supply of remarkable extent, anyway, even at the very best of the winter weeks past it has been rather slim pickings.

Some little success has been met with in this quest, though none of the flights have been heavy, either in ducks or geese. By going out in the sandhills the best waterfowl shooting has been found, but many hunters content themselves with a shorter stay and range up on the Missouri river or the Platte, including the numerous ponds that follow the courses of both bodies in their territory.

On one of these shorter trips three Omaha hunters had fair success last week. They were Fred Goodrich, G. W. Howard and W. Lewis, who spent a full week in the vicinity of De Soto. They showed a substantial bag on their return and the supposition is that they shot the birds.

No special variety of either ducks or geese predominated this year. Though flights are of no large proportions, they seem to include the usual share of each kind of bird.

GATE CITIES AFTER OMAHAS

Leadership in the Bowling League is in Serious Dispute at Last.

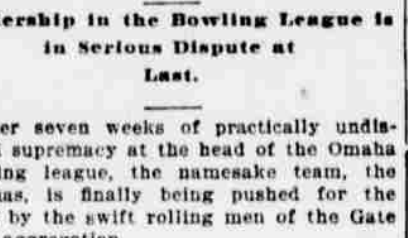
After seven weeks of practically undisturbed supremacy at the head of the Omaha Bowling league, the namesake team, the Omahas, is finally being pushed for the place by the swiftly rising men of the Gate City aggregation.

At the first of the season the Omahas jumped into the lead, and there they have remained, leading their nearest rivals by from 200 to 400 points in percentage except for the one time at the end of the third week when the Clarksons tied them for the nonce.

That, however, was at that early stage in the season's play when so few games had occurred that one night's bad rolling was sufficient to land a team several places below its former standing.
