The disgraceful proceedings at the meetng of the Board of Education Monday night were the talk of the town yesterday. President Bulla is to be called upon by a committee, so it is reported, and the request will be made that Janitor Sweringer and Carpenter Eckhelm be immediately suspended, if not discharged.

It was reported on the streets vesterday that since the incident the members of the Taxpayers' league would drop the whole matter and not bother the board any more A demand will, however, be made that the teachers who are reported as not having proper certificates be compelled to take an examination. To this President Bulla has acceded. He said yesterday that as soon as arrangements could be made examination papers would be prepared in order that

there might be no further complaint. As for the report of the experts engaged to check the books no showing has been made public, although a lot of talk has been indulged in and some hard things have been said about the members.

The request of the league to replace the architect of the board with a supervising superintendent is not considered practical by the members, and the proposition will hardly be considered. It is stated that an architect is needed to supervise repairs and draw plans when needed. As for the two carpenters employed a member said last night that some repairs were being needed and made at the school houses all of the time, and that two men are kept constantly

employed. In speaking of the affair yesterday a business man said that such actions at board meetings tended to disrupt the chools and lower the standard of efficiency, "Monday night's affair," remarked a poli ician yesterday, "only goes to show the lack of discipline maintained by the demo-

cratic board. Now is a good time to commence the agitation for a republican board. Three of the present members retire in the spring, and in my opinion their places should be filled with republicans who are business men of first-class standing in the community."

Cited for Contempt.

Although an ordinance providing for a general telephone franchise ordinance was ead to the council Monday night and reerred to the judiciary committee, it is understood that the Plattsmouth Telephone company will not accept the contemplated ordinance, even if does become a law.
