GIVES OMAHA DIRECT ROUTE TO MEXICO

and Will Open in January.

some Energetic Work in Railroad Building Accomplishes Large Results in a Single Season-Items of Rail Interest.

An official announcement to be made shortly from the headquarters of the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific railroad at Chicago will convey the information that the new short line from Herrington, Kan., down to El Paso, Tex., will be entirely completed by January 1, and that the entire extent of the line will be in operation by

January 15. This will mark the finishing, after a year's labor, of one of the largest jobs of actual trackage construction accomplished in the United States this year. The cut off that will be opened for service as a result of this building will be of the greatest importance for Omaha, Chicago and Kansas City as a short line to the Mexican gateway and to Arizona points and will take an entire day from the time now consumed in

making the journey. The new line will cut off over 200 miles of the trip from Omaha to El Paso. At present the route to El Paso via the Rock Island runs directly south from Herrington to Fort Worth, a distance of 442 miles, and then at right angles to this line west to El Paso over the Texas & Pacific, 614 miles, The new line is simply the hypotenuse of this right angle triangle from Herrington to Fort Worth to El Paso. It cuts straight across from Herrington to El Paso, down through Kansas to the extreme southwest corner of that state, then across a corner of Oklahoma, of Texas, of New Mexico and into Texas again. Over that line the ride from Omaha will be one of a day and two nights, thirty-six hours, a saving of four-teen hours. The cut under the Santa Fe

time will be twelve hours.

Bids for Const Business. As a result of this advantage the Rock Island will put in a strong bid for the main portion of the big Pacific coast business to the east, handled into El Paso by the Southern Pacific and now carried out of there chiefly by the Santa Fe, and also that
