DOUBT LOEB'S NEW DISCOVERY

Scientists Discuss the Professor's

Theories Regarding the

Living Cells. NEW YORK, Jan. 3 .- Prof. Starling, professor of physiology at the University Collegs of Nerve Specialists, according to a dispatch to the Journal, being asked conceening the discoveries of Prof. Loeb, said: "Prof. Loeb is a man whose opinion is worthy of respect, for he has accomplished great work in physiology. As to this par-ticular theory, I think little; it was a jump in the dark, one of the innumerable

theories on the same subject, made up partly of a number of views already known to the world. "The living cell or unit is a brick wall which physiologists have been unable to see through. Yet we can tell what goes on outside the cell, but no more. Prof. Loeb's theory is an attempt to see through the wall. One difficulty about this living thing is that it not only goes down, but up; it breaks down, then recovers itself, and theories like Loeb's explain half the process, the breakdown, but fail to explain the recovery. The real problem is the power of building up after breaking down.

"If Loeb's theory be partly true it only explains part, the less important part, of the secret of living cells. This marks an editor of the Medica Journal, said Prof. Loeb's explanation of

his theory consisted in a lot of assertions without a shadow of proof. Prof. William Ramsay of University col lege said he did not believe in the Lock theory, but qualified the remark by saying he was unable to speak with authority in
