RYAN KNOCKS OUT GREEN

Kansas City Middleweight Is Too Much for the Californian.

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 30.—Tommy Ryan of this city, who claims the middleweight championship of the world, tonight knocked out George Green of San Francisco in the seventh round of what was scheduled as a ten-round contest.

In the first round Ryan made it appear that it was to be a fast fight, so far as his side of the argument was concerned. After knocking Green over the ropes with a hard right in the ribs, he landed again with his left on Green's jaw with telling effect that the latter was forced to take the count.

Green made the best showing in the third round, when he landed a half dozen times, but without any apparent effect on Ryan, who landed a clean right-hander on the jaw, which knocked Green down.

Green was in great distress and ran around the ring to avoid his opponent. Ryan was waiting now only to land a knockout, and after one minute and twenty seconds in the seventh round, quick as a flash, he landed another right on the jaw and Green went flat on his back.
