wholesale district during the past few years have demonstrated the necessity of locating a new engine house in that territory. Accordingly the city has purchased recently a lot on the northwest corner of Eleventh and Jackson streets. We expect to erect there a commodious, up-to-date fire house to accommodate an engine and hose company and a hook and ladder company. They will be equipped with a No. I steam fire engine of the latest improved type, having the new Fox boiler, with hose wagons and with a new eighty-five foot hook and ladder truck like the one recently purchased for No. I engine house.

During recent years the equipment of the department has not imen replenished and much of the rubbar hose is rotten and the hose wagons are some of them worn out. It will be necessary to purchase at once four new hose wagons and from 5,000 to 7,000 feet of additional hose. There are few cities of 5,000 inhabitants that are not better supplied with fire aparatus and fire-nghing facilities than Omaha. I would therefore urge your honorable body to take into consideration the needs of the fire department when you make the annual levy.

Work of Other Departments.

It follows: OMAHA, Feb. 1, 1902.—To the Honorable, the Mayor and City Ccuncil—Gentlemen: I have the honor to herewith submit statement covering the work of the engineering and public works departments conducted under my directions during the year 1901. as city engineer and ex-officio chairman of the Hoard of Public Works.

In addition to this I also herewith submit data relating to municipal taxation in Omaha and other cities, in order to correct false conceptions resulting from misrepresentations and perversion of public records. City Engineer Rosewater also sent in

representations and perversion of public repords.

The city of Omaha has been repeatedly misrepresented by its local press as overtaxed to an extent to drive away capital seeking investment here. Its bonded debt has been inexcussibly exaggerated and made to appear nearly double what it really is, even by Omaha official publications issued at the expense of the city.

The bonded debt of Omaha is made to appear in the United States statistics as \$6.83.82, when in fact it is about one-half of that amount—a fact proven by the comptroller's report, from which it was obtained, which in a side note states the legal limit of bonded indebtedness is 10 for cent of the assessed value. This, in a separate column, is given as \$3.600,000, and as a matter of fact the bonded debt of Omaha is less than that, or over \$2.000,000, less than the comptroller's publications and the United States census statistics show it to be.

Duty of a Citizen.

I refer to this and the other tax data. although out of the line of my duty, because as the paid servant of the city and as a citizen I deem it proper to give the city its proper credit and to aid by lifting up rather than persistently pulling down the city, as has been so prevalent in the past few years. If all the energies of Omaha citizens engaged in fault finding and misrepresenting were devoted to uplifting and presenting conditions in their best light, public sentiment would be improved and public interests promoted.

As shown here, Omaha's debt is not only \$2,000,000 less than represented, but its general taxes are below the average of the cities of the United States ranging from 60,000 to 300,000 in population. Its expenditures for street service are among the very lowest of these cities and the cost of street cleaning is shamefully too low, that for 1901 being 50 per cent less than the average of these cities.

The total annual expenses for official salaries and department employes, including stationery and office expenses, being less than 10 per cent of the city tax. And yet the ever-recurring effort in the adjustment of the general annual tax levy is concentrated in attacking this 10 per cent and the other 90 per cent is algored. The trouble with Omaha taxation is not that it is too high, but that it is disproportionately distributed. The fault is with the system and not the tax itself. This fault originates with an open confession that the state laws requiring all property to be assessed at its fair value are knowingly and willfully violated by both county and city authorities, who claim to assess at 10 and 40 per cent valuation, respectively, and in doing so go astray by really assessing many properties at from 5 to 25 per cent of their values. This perversion of law by assessors, who, under instructions, violate their oaths, like a contagion, is infectious and results in false tax returns by all citizens.

therefore important to keep up all repairs from year to year to maintain their integrity.

The sewer work of the coming year will, doubtless, embrace the construction of from 1,000 to 1,500 feet of main sewer on the Saddle creek line to serve not only for future storin water disposal, but to replace a considerable amount of worn out bridging and make possible a practical revision of grades which will revive values to property seriously damaged by unnecessary embankments. Other main sewer construction will doubtless be needed in the northwest part of the city and a main outlet for the South Twenty-fourth street sanitary sewer will also be required. Ample funds for the construction of these mains are now in hand.

In connection with the sewer work it is proper to state that, aside from the ordinary sewer repairs, public drains, injets, etc., constructed by the sewer repair force of the city under the head of sewer maintenance, the water troughs and fountains were also placed in their charge during the past year. These fountains and troughs have not only been kept in repair, but have been kept in a good sanitary condition by periodic cleansing with concentrated lye.

It has been my aim to eliminate if possible the wooden walks from the list of constructions within the city. In the past year no permits have been issued for wooden walks nor contracts let for their repair. As soon as the old walks are allowed to go out of repair, they are taken up and no others allowed to replace them. One inspector has been almost constantly employed serving notices of dangerous walks on property owners, and reporting whether or not the notices have been heeded. This has been done and is necessary to protect the city from damage suits.

The aggregate of walks laid in the past year under contract with the city and taxed against the abutting property was 2.25 miles. In addition to this, there were laid under permits in pursuance of resolution of the mayor and city council. 7.82 miles of brick and artificial stone walks, making a total of 10.07 miles of permanent walks laid.

Viaducts.

Only one viaduct was constructed in 1901, that upon Twenty-fourth street over the Union Pacific and B. & M. tracks. This viaduct has a roadway thirty-five feet in width and walks on each side five feet in width, making a total width of forty-five feet and a total length of 1,664 feet. Its construction is of iron with a roadway of plank. Like the other viaducts heretofore constructed, its construction was at the expense of the railroad companies, who are also obligated to maintain the same in continuous repair. The approximate cost of the Twenty-fourth street viaduct was \$100,000. This viaduct closes a very important link between Omaha and South Omaha and will soon be one of the main street car routes, as well as for other kinds of traffic.

Among the most important and neglected requisites of municipal work in Omaha is the proper maintenance of clean and dustless streets. Independent of the fact that the city has invested over \$5,000,000 in pavements and to get the credit due to so large an investment ought to maintain the pavements clean, comfortable and inviting at all times. The sanitary condition which is the most important of all considerations, ought to induct a liberal annual allowance for street cleaning. The importance of clean, healthy streets is conceded by the cider eastern and progressive western cities, as will be seen by perusing the comparative excenditures shown in the accompanying tabular exhibit.

number of men employed upon a civil service basis, with pelice authority to enforce all sanitary rules and arrest any person caught sweeping store sweepings upon the walks or streets or throwing loose papers or other rubbish in the streets or alleys, a much better and cheaper service could be secured. In the absence of such an organisation, there should be at least a rigid enforcement of ordinances by our police so that teams hauling earth can not scatter it all over the paved streets, creating clouds of dust in dry weather and mud in wet seasons.

Street Sarinkling.

Under a charter a method is suggested for aliaying dust in the streets at a nominal cost, to be borne equally by all, viz: To district the city and let contracts for apprinkling under competitive bids, subject and under the control of the Board of Public Works. As done now, the Board of Public Works is ignored and the work is conducted in a "just-as-you-please" sort of manner in fimited areas and at the expense of a few who, rather than suffer the dust, sign agreements to pay a stipulated amount.

As stated in my prefatory remarks, I have prepared tabular data relating to taxation, compiled from information secured by direct correspondence and search into official reports of all cities ranging from 6,000 up to 30,000 population.

This data has been very difficult to secure and often required three letters of inquiry to complete the collation from any one city, owing to different methods of taxation and publication of reports. The study of these data will well repay the public, as it will go far to cofrect misconceptions as to our own city, it will be found by persual that the tax rate in Omaha is below the average of cities of upward of 90,000 population in the United States. There are a few cities which show a smaller rate per capita for street cleaning, and upon close examination it will be found their area is small and mileage of pavements very limited.

In the case of St. Joseph the comparison develops an unmistakable error in the enumerated population, which for that reason shows a less rate of tax per capita, but its tax per \$100 of valuation is greater.

Franchises and Contracts.

In addition to the data already referred to I have caused to be prepared a complete copy of all franchises and contracts relative to public service for more ready reference in the consideration from time to time of the requirements of the city. These are submitted in connection with this report.

The work of the department during the year, aside from the field engineering and construction, and the preparation of plans, specifications and estimates, has been very extensive and much greater than it is credited. As will be seen by the tabulation, M6 ordinances were prepared in the engineering department, sixty of which were special tax levies, with the necessary estimates and plats explanatory of their development. In concluding my review of the year I desire to express my special appreciation of the hearty co-operation of the assistant city engineer, Mr. George W. Craig of the tax levy clerk, Mr. E. T. Peterson, and the other employes of the department, all of whom have taken a deep interest in the work assigned them.
