Wants Quick Action.

"The prevalence of smallpox in Des Moines and other neighboring cities makes it imperative that immediate steps be taken by Omaha to protect itself. I believe the trainmen are very careful about admitting to trains persons who show symptoms of smallpox. Many of the strangers who have come to Omaha with the smallpox in the last year have been hoboes. They no doubt came to the city on freight trains, so the railroad officials will also be urged to have their freight crews exercise care in keeping the disase cut of the city. Very little smallpox has developed in Omaha. Most of the cases the city has cared for came to Omaha from other places. Council Bluffs and South Omaha have sent us a number

Demand Thousand Dollars for Failure to Produce Miss Morris.

SUPERINTENDENT PEARSE IS CONFUSED

He Disayows Any Intention to Annoy the Actress, but Case Against Broadhurst May Bring Trouble to Her.

For the Omaha public school teachers' ecture course Superintendent C. G. Pearse has begun in county court a suit 'agains Thomas W. Broadhurst to recover \$1,000 for breach of contract in having failed to roduce Clara Morris to lecture at Boyd's theater Tuesday night. As a means of recovering the amount there has already been nstituted proceedings in attachment and garnishment, and Deputy Sheriff Weber has served on Miss Morris papers, the intended effect of which is to prevent her and her husband, F. C. Herriott, from paying to Broadhurst any of the money they may be wing him now or after being paid the eccipts of future entertainments until be (Broadhurst) has settled the Omaha teachers' claim.

Superintendent Pearse confesses to having a rather confused idea of what he is loing, as an attorney is personally looking to the execution of the papers, but he disavows any intention of interfering with the future affairs of Miss Morris berself He states that the proceedings instituted here are directed at Broadhurst alone, though they may eventually come home to Miss Morris.

The contract for the lecture was made November 6, 1901, with Broadhurst, who guaranteed to produce Clara Morris for a ecture on the night of February 4. He failed to produce, and the teachers claim that the extent of the damage they sus-tained by reason of this failure was \$1,000. that sum being represented in the rent of the theater, the cost of help in making arrangements, the money that had to be refunded those who attended that night, but could not be present the following night, when the lecture was given.
