There were a good many steers included in the receipts this morning, and as buyers claimed that their reports showed a drop in prices at Chicago of 10620c, they were very bearish in their views at this point. They also claim that beef is costing fully as much here as it is in Chicago, and for that reason they are making a big effort to break the market. Buyers started out early and made the rounds, bidding a good deal lower on practically all kinds. Sellers, of course, did not make the concessions, and as a result the morning was well advanced before the steers began moving toward the scales. The market was unevenly lower, but 10665c would cover the decline in the majority of cases.

The cow market was a little more active The cow market was a little more active than the trade on steers and sellers in most cases had no difficulty in getting good firm prices for the better grades of both cows and heifers. There are not many of that kind coming forward, so that prices are holding up in good shape. The medium grades and canners, however, did not change hands as freely and the feeling was undoubtedly weak.

Good to choice veal calves and bulls sold in just about yesterday's notches, but others were slow sale and weak. Stags in most cases sold lower in sympathy with the decline on steers. the decline on steers.

"Well," protested Mr. Lodge, "I have denied that statement most emphatically." A communication was received from the secretary of war transmitting to the senate a memorial from the leaders of the federal party in the Philippines in support of American rule in the islands. Mr. Hoar, disclaiming any desire to precipitate a debate at this time, remarked sarcastically that the memorial was "a pretty good commentary" on the state of the Philippine commission, which prohibited the promulgation by any society of any political epinion or policy. He said it appeared lawful under the acts of the commission to publish opinions when three members of the Philippine commission were members of the society, provided that the publication be accompa nied by an expression of "marvellous ad-

miration" for the commission itself. Mr. Patterson thought the senate ought to understand the special significance of the document presented by the federal party. He appealed that the majority be perfectly frank with the Filipinos, that course being, in his judgment, the best to pursue. The senate then, at 5 o'clock, went into executive session and five minutes later ad-
