Since Washington advice indicates that the garrison at Fort Crook is to be enlarged to accommodate a regiment, those who have long been in favor of a street car line to the post evince considerable interest in the matter.

Judge Breen, one of the prominent members of the East Side Improvement club, and Judge Agnew of the South Side Improvement club are in favor of the proposed line, and it is understood that at an early date a joint committee of the two clubs, as well as a committee from the council, will be appointed to wait upon the officers of the Omaha Street Railway company to see what can be done toward the construction of a line along Thirtieth street to Fort Crook.

CONVENTION BEE IS BUZZING

County Commissioners to Participate in Two Charity Meetings

TO ENDEAVOR TO BRING NATIONAL HERE

Delegation Will Go to Milwaukee Next June with Avowed Purpose of Inducing Big Organization to Visit Omaha.

The county commissioners have the convention before them in their hands with particular diligence at present. Tuesday of next week they go to Fremont to grate before the state convention of the Nebraska Commissioners and Supervisors' association and after that they are planning to send the charity committee and perhaps some others to Milwaukee to attend the June convention of the charity associations of the United States and secure its next meeting for Omaha if possible.

It has been the custom for only the county agent to attend these charity conventions, but because of the new plan to secure the convention for Omaha, which plan is said to be favored by several local charity workers who wish to strengthen the movement here, it is now proposed to send the whole committee, which includes Connolly, Hartie and O'Keefe.

To the Fremont convention the delegation from Omaha will include the entire board and perhaps County Clerk Miller and other members of the board. The board has entered into a new brotherhood with apparently a better understanding and the icicles that used to hang perpetually in the door between their respective rooms have thawed, leaving the way clear to a free and untrammelled interchange of ideas.

The program doesn't announce what Commissioner O'Keefe is to talk about, if anything, and Commissioner Connolly says he may talk about two minutes in the debates, but will not prepare any special paper.

The final arrangements for the trip are to be made at the meeting Friday morning. There is also to be brought up then the demand for Omaha if possible.

At 2:30 this afternoon at the Boyd theater the big fight on the Elks' fair will be given. The program is as follows: F. A. Nash, George E. Pritchett, James G. Martin, George E. Towle and E. C. Page.
