HOLDS COAL MINE CLAIMS

Governor Savage Fails to Investigate Reports Submitted. BRIEF IN OMAHA COMMISSION CASE

Attorney General Prout Submits Argument in Behalf of Executive—Nebraskans and Irrigation Congress.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Feb. 24.—(Special.)—Two applications for reward for the discovery of coal in Nebraska were filed in the governor's office several months ago, but have not yet received official consideration.

One claim was presented by farmers residing in the vicinity of Milford and the other came from Swedeburg, where a small shaft is already in operation. The applications were assigned to a pigeon hole in one of the desks in the executive department and no steps have been taken to investigate the discoveries reported.

Inquiry at the governor's office this afternoon elicited no information regarding the claims. Mr. Clancy, private secretary to the governor, said he had heard nothing of them.

The law on the subject reads as follows: "That when it shall be made apparent to the governor of Nebraska by affidavit of the owner or owners thereof that a vein of coal not less than twenty-six inches in depth and of sufficient capacity to pay to mine, and within paying distance from the surface, has been discovered, it shall be the duty of the governor to appoint a suitable person to investigate the same, whose duty it shall be to report the probable extent and capacity of said vein or veins."

Mr. Clancy said that so far as he knew nobody had been appointed to investigate the claims. Omaha Fire and Police Commission. An extended argument in behalf of the governor in the Omaha fire and police commission mandamus case was filed by Attorney General Prout in the supreme court today.

In reciting the issues the attorney general declares that the state constitution divides the government into three distinct departments and requires each department to act exclusively within its own sphere. It is upon this principle that the governor will make his defense in the hearing before the court on March 4.

Summing up his argument Mr. Prout says: "In questioning the jurisdiction of this honorable court to in any manner control or direct the action of the executive, who is the chief executive of this state, in the most cordial feeling and the highest respect, we do so with a feeling of confidence that neither our position nor motives will be misconstrued or regarded as disrespectful or defiant. For this court, as the judicial branch of the government, the respondent, who represents the executive branch of that same government, has only the most cordial feeling and the highest respect; and, were this a matter touching only his own personality as an individual citizen, he would not have hesitated to submit to a suggestion from this honorable court to pursue this line of conduct to be pursued. This is not a matter personal to the respondent, but is one which affects the entire future of this great commonwealth. It is an attempt on the part of the relator to have the court, the judicial branch of the government, coerce the action of the executive branch of the government to make one of its departments of the government subordinate and subservient to another, that such condition is never made a part of the framers of our constitution nor by the people who by their votes made that document the supreme law of the state, it made manifest by the constitution itself, which provides:

"The powers of the government of this state are divided into three distinct departments: the legislative, executive and judicial, and no person, or collection of persons, shall exercise any power properly belonging to either of the others, except as hereinafter expressly directed or permitted."—Constitution, article II.

There, the respondent feels that it is his duty under the constitution, which he has sworn to uphold, to point out to the relator that the attempt to have the relator to subvert the above provision of the constitution to further a personal or political end of certain individuals, persons represented by the relator and to cite arguments and authorities to the court, posing this most pernicious doctrine—a doctrine which, if accomplished, would tend to overthrow the constitution and our institutions; a purpose, to the accomplishment of which the relator is confident this court will never lend its aid.

The exemption of such officers from such coercion by the courts is not a mere personal privilege which the incumbent of the office may waive at his pleasure, but is a restriction reserved for the public good. State against Dike, 20 Minn. 383.

Republican Primaries. Republican primaries for the nomination of candidates for city and school district officers will be held tomorrow afternoon. Officers to be elected at the forthcoming election are: Police judge, water commissioner, city attorney, one councilman from each ward and three members of the school board. For water commissioner there are two candidates, A. Hayes Meyer and James Taylor. E. C. Strode, present city attorney, will have no opposition for the nomination. The candidates for police judge are Walter L. Anderson and P. James Coegrave. There are contests in five of the seven wards.

The nominations will be made under the Lincoln system. Polling places will be open from 12 m to 7 p. m. Nebraskans and Irrigation. A delegation of Nebraskans will start tomorrow for Sterling, Colo., to attend the Interstate Irrigation congress, which will convene Wednesday morning for a two days' session. Among the men of this state who are named on the program for speeches are Governor Savage, Chancellor Andrews, Francis G. Hamer of Kearney, Judge C. E. Stubbs, Deputy Attorney General Norris Brown and Secretary Adna Deason of the Board of Irrigation. Nearly all of these have expressed their opinion that they will be unable to accompany the delegation.

Chase-Harwood Wedding. Miss Helen Cook Harwood of this city and Clarence Melville Chase of Boston will be married tomorrow afternoon at the home of the bride, 1618 L street. Only relative and close friends of the contracting young people will be present. The bride is the daughter of the late Nathan S. Harwood, who was president of the First National bank during the last few years of his life.

ALLEGED CROOK IS CAUGHT

Charged with Passing a Forged Draft on Nebraska Bank and Issuing Worthless Checks. FREMONT, Neb., Feb. 24.—(Special.)—Word was received here today that A. Morse, the man who is alleged to have passed a forged draft \$500 on the Fremont National bank about a month ago, had been arrested in Oklahoma. Morse claimed to be a steward for a party of men engaged in making a geological survey for the government. The bank did not credit him with the proceeds of the draft, but forwarded it for collection, so they lost nothing. He paid several small bills here with bogus checks drawn on his alleged account at the Fremont National and in Kansas City he is reported to have washed off a check on the same bank, purporting to have been signed by one F. I. Adams. He also passed some checks of the same kind, it is claimed, in Grand Island. The case is in the hands of the Pinkerton detective agency. The telegram did not state whether Morse's arrest was for the Fremont forgeries or some similar work elsewhere. Morse is near 35 years old, five feet seven inches tall, has a dark complexion and a rough face, slightly plighted, and wears a small stubby, dark mustache. The bank officials think he is a professional at the business.

Gasoline Tank Explodes. Timman Receives Frightful Burns from the Bursting of a Soldering Pot. NIOBRARA, Neb., Feb. 24.—(Special.)—While A. E. Yanting was soldering some tinware and using an air pressure gasoline fire pot, the tank suddenly burst, throwing fire and gasoline all over him. One of his assistants hearing the report, went to his assistance and managed to smother the fire out, receiving bad burns himself. Mr. Yanting was frightfully burned about the face and hands. No damage resulted from the fire.

Alleged Chicken Thieves. Two Men Held in Jail at Hastings Charged with Robbing a Roost. HASTINGS, Neb., Feb. 24.—(Special.)—C. L. Lewis, alias C. L. Williams, and C. E. Mackey, both of Hastings, were placed under arrest here today and are being held for the wholesale robbery of poultry. Mr. Briggs of Hansen had nearly two dozen chickens stolen from his place last night and it is alleged that Williams and Mackey are the guilty persons.

Table Rock School Board. A. C. Boyd Resigns as a Member and C. I. Norris is Appointed to Fill Vacancy. TABLE ROCK, Neb., Feb. 24.—(Special.)—A. C. Boyd, a member of the school board in Table Rock, who was elected in January to his old home in New York, and has concluded to remain there, has resigned as a member of the school board. The vacancy has been accepted at a board meeting. C. I. Norris, was appointed to fill the vacancy.

Demure to Original Petition. PLATTSBROUGH, Neb., Feb. 24.—(Special.)—Before County Judge J. E. Douglas today in the case of the application to set aside the decree of the adoption of Robert E. Sampson by Val Burket and wife, the respondents demurred to the original petition and ten days' time was given to plead to relator's amended petition filed therein.

Beatrice District Court. BEATRICE, Neb., Feb. 24.—(Special Telegram.)—District court convened here this afternoon with Judge Letton presiding. The afternoon was taken up in calling the docket and assigning cases for trial. The case of Stevens against Kyd, a suit on sheriff's bond, will be heard tomorrow morning.

Wounded by Bursting of Gun. SUMNER, Ia., Feb. 24.—(Special Telegram.)—Will Dawson was fatally wounded by a bursting gun while mark shooting. He almost died to death before the arrival of a physician.

Nebraska and Nebraskans. Crete will decide at the spring election whether the city shall own an electric light plant. New machinery is being put into the Columbus woodcutting factory and the output is to be increased. McCook is the latest place to have an attack of the oil craze and company is to be organized to sink a test well. The Congressionalists of Taylor have made the last payment on the debt which has been hanging over the parsonage. The Friend Telegraph has started in on its twenty-fifth year and will continue to express its editor's ideas without uttering.

The company which has been organized at Valparaiso to prospect for coal has decided to go ahead and contract with experts to put down a core drill to a sufficient depth to ascertain whether there is coal in that vicinity. Ephraim Ferguson was brought back from Washington by the Custer county authorities on a suspending episode. His preliminary hearing resulted in acquittal, there being no evidence against him. Chris Burby, who lives in Custer county, was not so fortunate, but was bound over to stand trial in the district court. Frank Johnson, of Central City sold a number of hogs to Sutton & Harris local livestock dealers. After the sale had been consummated and the money paid the dealers became angry and started an investigation. This resulted in the discovery that Johnson had stolen the hogs from the dealers and they had been sold to the owners. Johnson owned up when arrested, and was sentenced to the reform school.

HOTEL CLERK IN TROUBLE

Landlord Charges Him with Opening Letters and Stealing Checks. MAIL FOUND IN ROOM HE OCCUPIED

He Denies the Charge and is Held in Jail to Await Trial—Postal Authorities Informed About the Case. COLUMBUS, Neb., Feb. 24.—(Special.)—Roy McKee, night clerk at the Meridian hotel for the past three months until recently, is in jail here, charged by Landlord Wisentine with stealing two checks, one for \$58 and the other for \$109, both being the property of John Linder. A number of letters put into the private mailing box at the hotel on January 23 failed to reach their destination and complaints were received by Mr. Wisentine, but no explanation could be made until a few days ago, when an employee found the missing letters in the commode drawer of the room occupied by McKee. All the letters had been opened. As the letters had not reached the custody of Uncle Sam, it is not known here what penalty the postal regulations would attach to the crime, but inquiry has been made of the department.

McKee was found at David City and arrested. He pleaded not guilty when arraigned before County Judge Robinson this morning. He was given time to secure counsel and the date for the preliminary hearing has not been set.

CAUSES SERIOUS RUN ON BANK Depositor Takes Closing Notice on Washington's Birthday for Sign of Collapse. DETROIT, Feb. 24.—A run was started on the Jefferson avenue branch of the Dime Savings bank about noon today and soon after 2 o'clock it spread to the bank here at the corner of Griswold and Fort streets. Depositors were paid as fast as the accounts could be checked up and the currency could be counted out.

At 3 o'clock, the regular hour for closing the bank, it was crowded with anxious depositors and the lines of people who wanted to close their accounts extended through the door and some distance down Fort street. Instead of closing the bank the directors decided to hold it open until 6 o'clock. The receiving teller and his assistant dropped their usual work and assisted in paying the depositors. Until 6 o'clock accounts were closed as rapidly as possible.

President Livingston addressed the people from the steps of the bank and said that while the bank would not close, it would open at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning and every depositor would be paid in full. It is impossible to learn what was the direct cause of the run. It is said a Polish depositor of the Jefferson Avenue bank saw a sign on the door Saturday stating the bank was closed on account of Washington's birthday. He had circulated the report that the bank was closed and frightened the depositors. The news gradually spread down town and started the run on the bank. Help was immediately offered by the other local banks. It was declined, however, the Dime bank having plenty of funds in its own vaults.

Tonight President Livingston said: "We have ample funds on hand and if necessary could have sufficient money in the bank in forty-eight hours to pay every depositor in full."

BRYAN DENIES THE STORY Says He Has Not Expoused the Candidacy of David B. Hill. COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 24.—William Jennings Bryan was the guest of honor at a luncheon given by Colonel James Kilbourne at noon at his residence. Prominent democratic leaders were present, and a conference was held. Colonel Bryan later for David B. Hill, where he delivered a lecture before the students of the Ohio Wesleyan university tonight.

When asked regarding the truth of the report that he would call on David B. Hill and pledge him his support for the presidential nomination in 1904, Colonel Bryan said with emphasis: "I have never made any such statement as that and what I may have to say regarding the presidential nomination two years hence I will say in my own way and at a time which I may deem proper."

WANTED BACK IN ARKANSAS Alleged Bank Robbers Are Held in Kansas for Return to Former State. WICHITA, Kan., Feb. 24.—The governor of Arkansas has sent a requisition to Kansas for John Dunn and George Dunham, under arrest here for the robbery of a bank at Clarksville, Ark., four weeks ago. Dunn came to a hospital here ten days ago to have a bullet removed in the groin for the sake of his life. He would give no information about himself except that a jealous woman shot him. The wound seemed to be about two weeks old. Dunham followed Dunn here to take care of him, and was arrested. His attendance upon Dunn aroused suspicion and he was also placed in custody.

DATE OF WOODWARD HANGING

Murderer of Sheriff Ricker to be Executed Friday, March Twenty-Eight. CASPER, Wyo., Feb. 24.—(Special Telegram.)—Charles Woodward, convicted of the murder of Sheriff William C. Ricker, the Natrona county official who was shot down at Woodward's ranch in the Rattle Snake mountains last month, is to be hanged on Friday, March 28. Judge C. W. Brann passed sentence at 10 o'clock this morning, the sentence covering several typewritten pages. The closing paragraph follows: "Listen now, you, Charles Francis Woodward, are to be hanged from hence to the county jail, therein to be confined under proper guard, as provided by law, until March 28, at which time you will be taken to an enclosure specially provided within the jail yard and there hanged by the neck until you are dead, and may God, whose laws you have broken, and before whose tribunal you must then appear, have mercy on your soul."

Woodward showed no signs of worry and he seems to be resigned to his fate. On the way back to jail he talked and laughed with those about him, the only time he exhibited emotion being when reference was made to his wife.

COURT SENTENCES STEVENS But His Attorney Stays Its Execution with a Writ of Error from Supreme Court. MITCHELL, S. D., Feb. 24.—(Special Telegram.)—Fred L. Stevens, who was convicted two months ago in the circuit court of this county for having received money in the bank of Plankinton when he knew the same to be insured, appeared before Judge Smith this afternoon to receive his sentence. The court sentenced him to four years and six months.

Judge Fellows, attorney of Stevens, presented a writ of error and certificate of probable cause from the supreme court, which stays the execution of the sentence until the supreme court rules on the case as to whether Stevens shall have a new trial. His bail was fixed at \$2,000, which was given at once. The motion for a new trial will likely be argued at the April term of the supreme court.

State Militia at Pyle's Funeral. PIERRE, S. D., Feb. 24.—(Special Telegram.)—As Attorney General Pyle was judge advocate general of the South Dakota state guard, Adjutant General Conkling has requested the officers of the companies at Aberdeen, Redfield, Clark and Volga to report at Huron with as many men as possible to attend the funeral.

Commissioner of Deeds Appointed. PIERRE, S. D., Feb. 24.—(Special Telegram.)—Governor Herried today issued a commission to Samuel L. Taylor as commissioner of deeds for South Dakota at Philadelphia.
