

DENIAL OF ENGLISH STORY

Emperor William's Espial Fringe of Miss Roosevelt's Message is Shown.

CONTRADICTS THE REPORT FROM ENGLAND

German Press Generally Regards Visit of Prince as Good Omen of Mutual Friendship of Two Nations.

BERLIN, March 4.—Emperor William, in order of being displeased with the telegram of Miss Alice Roosevelt concerning the launching of Meteor, as some of the English newspapers say, because of its familiar tone, was, on the contrary, very much pleased with it.

A member of the cabinet states that after an audience with Emperor William February 28, official business having been finished, he was about to leave when the Kaiser remarked: "I must show you the charming telegram I have just received from Miss Alice Roosevelt."

He then handed to her the charming telegram and she expressed his pleasure over this telegram and has praised its natural and uncontrived form.

The correspondent here of the Associated Press has been officially informed of Emperor William's satisfaction at the reception accorded to Prince Henry. The informant of the correspondent had seen Emperor William's marginal notes on the reports of Prince Henry's trip. He said:

Emperor Unusually Pleased.

His majesty is in the highest degree pleased with Prince Henry's reception from his arrival in America and especially that accorded by President Roosevelt and his family. The Emperor has also expressed himself as delighted with the enthusiasm of the welcome to his brother.

During the audience with Prince Henry at the German embassy, Emperor William expressed himself as highly satisfied with Prince Henry's reception and said he looked forward with particular interest to the prince's visit to Cambridge. Emperor William said to Prince Henry, as a compliment to Harvard university:

The German newspaper men are immensely impressed with Prince Henry's bearing toward the newspaper men of the United States and believe that Emperor William's perception of the influence of the press in national politics is a result of the States will effect favorably the relations of the crown to the home press.

Herr Bachem, the editor of the Cologne Volks Zeitung in an article in which he criticizes the previous conclusion, contrasts the social and political positions of editors here and in the United States, where newspaper men are selected to serve as cabinet ministers and ambassadors, not because they are better educated or more able, but, Herr Bachem says because they receive high salaries.

Visit Won't Change Policy.

Herr Bachem is of the opinion that the journey of Prince Henry will not modify the aspirations of the United States which are conceived to be first, to break into European markets while excluding Europe from its own markets, and second to divide the mastery of the seas with Great Britain.

Herr Libermann von Sonnenberg, radical anti-Semite, who made a violent outburst against Mr. Chamberlain, the British colonial secretary last January, said in the Reichstag today that the visit of Prince Henry would lead to a friendly rapprochement between the United States and Germany.

The Kreuz Zeitung, devotes two columns to advocating the establishment of a

Direct news service between Germany and the United States, avoiding English channels, where, the paper assumes, intelligence is given a political bias.

A letter has been received from the secretary of the National oil company stating that a sufficient number of Omaha men had been secured to make the co-operative business a success from the start.

According to the plan the company will expend about \$2,000 in establishing its plant before any of the stock subscribed by the local grocers becomes due.

The purchase of the eastern company will include the purchase of sufficient ground upon trackage to contain four tanks having a capacity of at least 12,000 gallons each.
