

## SOUTHWEST CITIZENS MEET Improvement Club Decides to Call for

Lights on Twenty-Fourth

Street.

The Southwest Improvement club met last night, and for the first time in two months President W. H. Green, presided. The reports of the treasurer and the committee in charge of the last banquet were received and approved.

M. J. Feenan called up the question of electric lights on Twenty-fourth street, saying that there should be at least eight lights between Leavenworth and Vinton streets. A committee, consisting of D. W. Shull, F. Harmon, W. H. Green and Henry Rohlff, was appointed to take the matter up with the mayor and city council.

The question of the change of grade on Twenty-fourth atreet between Leavenworth and Pacific was brought up. It was stated that the traffic over that street had increased considerably since the completion of the viaduct, and the coming season will find the street impassable. Property owners said that they would sign no petitions for paving until the grade is changed. President Green said that after his investigation in the east he had come to the cor clusion that a wide street did not make a good town and he did not care to have streets so wide as to bankrupt the people to pay for paving.
