HALTS IN THE RHEA CASE

Governor Savage Awaits Attitude of Supreme Court.

MAY THEN LISTEN TO PARDON PLEASE

Lincoln Has Its Final Anti-Saloon Rally Today—Driver of Horse Wagon Badly Hurt in Runaway.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, March 29.—(Special.)—Governor Savage will take no action on the numerous petitions for executive clemency in behalf of William Rhea until the supreme court has ruled on his motion for a rehearing. The court is expected to announce its decision at the next sitting and if unfavorable to Rhea the governor will then listen to requests for the pardon or commutation of the man's sentence. The date of execution as fixed by the court is April 25.

Final Rally in Anti-Saloon Campaign.

The final rally of the anti-saloon campaign will be held at the Auditorium tomorrow afternoon. Among those who are advertised to speak are Chancellor Huntington of the Nebraska Wesleyan university, Rev. Fletcher L. Wharton and A. G. Wolfenbarger. The meeting will be under the auspices of the Citizens' No-Licenses league.

Driver William Eddy of horse wagon No. 1 was seriously injured in a runaway accident this morning. A vital part of his team's harness broke and the horse, dashing forward, pulled him to the pavement and dragged him a distance of 100 feet. He was picked up in an insensible condition and removed to his home, 1745 Q street. He sustained severe internal injuries.

District Court Has No Business. The district court of this county will meet next Saturday and probably adjourn till the May term. The jury was discharged early this week and practically no business has been considered by the judges since that time with the exception of one question in the Lincoln Traction company tax case.

Mrs. E. J. Shellhorn, wife of Representative Shellhorn died at her home, Twenty-fourth and O streets, at 8 o'clock this morning. She had been in ill-health several months, but the immediate cause of her death was a complicated stomach trouble.

The French consul at Chicago has written to Governor Savage for information regarding the whereabouts of Charles Perry, who is known to have resided in this state in 1893. The man's address is wanted by Rene Renault, attorney at the Paris court of appeals.

Canning Factory Needs Acquire.

NEBRASKA CITY, Neb., March 29.—(Special.)—The officers of the canning company are having trouble in securing the acreage needed for their season's run. They need

1,000 acres of corn and 200 acres of tomatoes, and have thus far been able to contract for less than 400 acres of corn and about seventy-five acres of tomatoes. They are saying as good prices as any concerns in this part of the country, and more than many, and their plant provides a market for produce for from five to ten miles around. If they can't get the stuff they can't run, and the farmers will feel the difference when they want to market their apples.

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
