rected to be built. The following authorized statement conricerning the propositions of Colombia as they stand amended was made public today:

The United States is granted exclusive right to construct, operate and protect a canal, as well as all railreads, telegraph and telephone lines and auxiliary works within the zone. The zone is six miles wide and includes the islands of Flaminco, Naos and Perico, in Panama bay. It is to be under the joint judicial control of the United States and Colombia.

Colombia gives unqualified consent to the sale and transfer of the Panama Canal company's rights to the United States and exempts the latter country from all taxes, import duties, etc. She grants to the United States and exempts the latter country from all taxes, import duties, etc. She grants to the United States a lease of the canal strip in perpetuity. For convenience, it is divided into periods of 100 years, renewable at the option of the United States. Colombia asks for a lump payment of \$7,000,000 after the exchange of ratifications, to be considered as "on account."

For fourteen years Colombia waives all compensation for the canal rights. This period will more than cover the time of construction.
