

# Mott Confirms Statement.

"Do you know whether the stockholders have taken any interest as such in the reduction ?"

"I do not: I know nothing about it." Henry C. Mott, purchaser of raw sugar for the trust, was the next witness. He said he had acted in that capacity for the last five years and that he buys all the raw sugar for the company except the Louisiana sugars. He confirmed previous statements that the trust had bought 93,000 tons of Cuban sugar since January 1. He said that in the course of the year the American company purchases 50 per cent of the Cuban sugar product and that he supposed the other 50 per cent is semiral by other sugar refiners in the United States.

Mr. Donner confirmed Mr. Havemeyer's statement, that of the trust's purchases of at least fifty singers.


