Quiet Day in Grain Trading, Though Prices Ascend.

MARKED STRENGTH IN HOG PRODUCTS

Good Packers' Support Alds Strong Values in Provisions and Firm Underione Prevails in Cereals-Onts Being Active.

CHICAGO, May 9.—Grain tracing was very quiet today, waiting for the government report on the crop situation which is expected tomorrow. In spite of the slow-ness of the market, however, a very firm undertone prevailed and July wheat closed by higher, July corn 162% o higher and July oats %c up. Provisions were again independently strong and closed 7%c to 17% cadvance.

At the outset wheat showed a tolerably firm tone on dry weather in northwest, with still further retarded spring sowing because of moisture and crop damage reports from Kansas. Yesterday's cash situation was still bullishly effective and handlers of cash stuff still reported a continuance of the demand aroused during the recent decline. Offerings were light and receipts were amail. Although the demand was only fair it was sufficient to hold up the market. A fair export business was done at the seaboard, is loads being reported. The Michigan state crop report showed a condition of 82 against 85 per cent last month. Minneapolis and Duluth reported that stocks would show a decrease of 1,000,000 bushels. On these influences July, which opened unchanged to 55c higher, at 74%c to 74%c, sold up to 75c, fluctuated narrowly and closed firm, %c up at 74%c. Local receipts were 51 cars, 2 of contract grade; Minneapolis and Duluth reported; Minneapolis and Duluth received 153 cars, making a total for the three points of 204 cars, against 252 last week and 233 a year ago. The opening was higher on the wheat advance and colder weather, but continued small receipts, decilining stocks and the good cash demand governed the pit. As usual of late the crowd quickly followed the lead of the leading buil house. Some small scalpers sold, as did commission house, early, and caused a dip, but when the buils began to buy September, whereas for several days

September closed with a gain of %c at 60%c and July, after selling at 61%c, closed %6%c up at 61%c. Favorable weather for seeding and growth of the already planted corn seem not to effect an increase in country offerings. Receipts were very small, at 75 cars.

Oats experienced a strong and fairly active market most of the session. The leading bull professional in May options was in the pit buying fairly, as also were several big commission houses. There is still some fear of manipulation of the pit by the principal bull. Corn strength caused part of the upturn, but receipts and offerings were small, shipping sales were larke and the cash premium influenced the market. July closed strong at its top figures, %c higher at 36%c. Receipts were 156 cars.

There was some fair liquidation for profits in hog products, but it was not sufficient to retard a good advance. Prices were higher ail day and the tone ruled strong on the higher prices at the yards, a good packers' support and outside buying. July pork closed 17%c higher at \$17.42%, July lard 10c up at \$10.32% and July ribs 7%c higher at \$1.72%.
