Near the Colonel When He Fell.

J. R. Wilcox and M. A. Tucker of Beattle, Kan., were the first of the surviving members of the Twenty-third Iowa infantry, the regiment which Colonel Kinsman was in rive here for the unveiling of the monument this afternoon.

Mr. Wilcox was color sergeant of the face a few minutes after Colonel Kinsman received his death wound at Black River Bayou. Both he and Mr. Tucker saw the gullant colonel fall. In fact, they were lose to him at the time. Colonel Kinsman. they say, after being struck, staggered, but regained his feet and proceeded fifty steps at least, waving his sword, before he fell to rise no more. The last words of the colonel were, they say: "Come ahead, boys, we will take them yet."

"STONEWALL'S" FATALISM.

Jackson Prayed to the God of Battles While Shell Fell.

Stonewall Jackson was as absolute fatalist as Napoleon, with this difference that Jackson was a man with a religious lunatic asylum in Ohlo, where he was kept for nearly a year, has brought suit against the Chicago & Northwestern Railroad company for \$55,485. The suit is the outcome of a series of sensational events. Paust lived on a farm in Marshall county hear the Northwestern railroad and his barn was burned one night while he was in Des Moines and much property destroyed. He brought suit to recover insurance and also against the railroad company on the ground that the fire was started by the company.
