

GIBSON FOOLS THE ROUKES

Let Them Down With Only Two Men's Little Hits.

ALLOWAY POUNDED PLENTY BY VISITORS

Last Game of Series Goes to Kansas City by Wide Margin Owing to Difference in Batting.

The pitching of Gibson was sufficient to lose for Omaha the last game with Kansas City by a score of 7 to 1, before 1,000 people. JOLIET IN GRASP OF FLOOD

All the Lower Portion of the City is Now Under Water.

SEVERAL LIVES ARE PROBABLY LOST

Scores of Residences Have from One to Three Feet of Water in First Stories and Damage Will Be Very Heavy.

JOLIET, Ill., June 3.—Joliet is in the grasp of the worst flood in its history. All the lower portion of the city is under water and it is rumored that several lives have been lost. The police have the names of Eddie McGovern, Lizzie McGeary and a little girl named Kennedy as drowned. Several families had narrow escapes and the police rescued many in haste. It is stated that several houses and other buildings were swept away in the floods. Jefferson and other principal streets are under water and business places are flooded, causing thousands of dollars of damage.

The street car lines are all seriously damaged and no cars are running. All trains are stalled, water being two feet deep over the railroad tracks. Severe washouts have occurred on the electric line between here and Chicago. Heavy rains, which continued all night, caused Hickory and Spring creeks to burst their banks in haste. It is stated that Hickory creek dam, east of the city, has partially collapsed, sending the flood of waters down in a torrent. Scores of homes have from one to three feet of water in the first stories.

Mayor Barry called a special meeting of the council for this afternoon to take measures for the relief of the homeless. Scores of people were driven from their homes by the floods. The damage was more widespread than at first supposed, the estimated property damage reaching \$75,000 to \$100,000. Factories and cellars all over the city are flooded. Many streets are ruined, the pavements being all washed away and hundreds of small buildings are wrecked. The early report that a portion of Hickory creek dam was washed out has been confirmed. There has been serious trouble as yet from the drainage channel. Part of the penitentiary was flooded, but not seriously, and the convicts are at work as usual. The water did not reach the cell houses or shops.

Measures for Relief. In addition to Mayor Barry's call for a special meeting of the city council, he has issued a proclamation for a general meeting of citizens this evening to devise relief measures. Subscriptions for the homeless and needy are being raised and one merchant has donated \$500 worth of provisions. The flood is slowly receding. The Rock Island bridge over the drainage canal has been moved eighteen inches out of line by the flood and no trains can pass. The tracks of the Chicago & Alton and the Santa Fe are under water and a Santa Fe bridge south of the city was washed away. Ten miles of Michigan Central transfer track is ruined and a bridge leading to the Union elevator was carried away. The Joliet Stove works plant is flooded with four feet of water and the damage amounts to nearly \$10,000. The Joliet Warehouse company is damaged to the extent of \$10,000 and other losses in the same way are reported from all parts of the city. Business is paralyzed and all the schools are closed. The streets that are not submerged are thronged with sightseers. The police and firemen, assisted by volunteer squads of helpers, are at work all over the city relieving suffering and trying to restore order.

Committees were appointed to raise the necessary funds and to make arrangements. There will be a parade in the morning, races and other attractions at the Driving park in the afternoon and fireworks and dancing in the park in the evening. It was decided to procure at least four bands and music will be a prominent feature of the celebration.

TWELVE YEARS FOR ASSAULT

James Abbott Convicted at Truncheon of Crime Committed Last March.

TECUMSEH, Neb., June 3.—(Special Telegram.)—James Abbott, the suspect here in the Goldsby assault case, was positively identified in the district court today as one of the men who brutally assaulted Miss Matilda Goldsby at her home near Tecumseh last March.
