The World correspondent afterward spoke to an official here, who alone has knowledge of Mr. Morgan's condition and plans and who said: 'Mr. Morgan has gone for a fortnight's cruise to Athens, because he is almost worn out from the strain. He is not broken down, but his condition gives cause for anxiety. He is doing no business. All letters will be held for him here until he returns from Athens. If the heat proves too great he may return immediately. otherwise his plan is to arrive here about the middle of June and go to Lordon for

the coronation. "He is in a nervous condition and has placed himself unreservedly in the hands of a doctor. He saw no one here except Colonel Thompson of the steam yacht Torfrida, whom he went to thank last evening for giving him his pilot. At 1 o'clock the czar takes his place at the family table with the empress and sometimes the little princess. Until 4 o'clock he gives his time to his family. He plays with his children, romps with them and even takes part in hide and seek with them. From 4 to 7 o'clock he remains shut up in his study, coming out only when dinner is served. After dinner he smokes several cigarettes and toward
