This happened when Judge Norris was a candidate for a second term of the position, which he now holds.

Enthuslastic and Sanguine.

Never since the days of the big republican majorities in this section of the state has there been so much interest manifested in a congressional convention. From each governor, but his most sanguine adherents of the eighteen counties came an enthusiastic delegation, and candidates were almost as numerous as when the republicans out-

numbered the fusionists in the district by several thousands. About half of the delogates arrived last night and the others came on the early morning trains. Nearly all of the candidates opened headquarters in the Bostwick this morning, but did nothing more than receive their friends and mingle with the crowd. The utmost harmony prevailed in the preliminary skir-

mishing. In the handshaking the candidates were joined by two aspirants for the gubernatorial nomination, J. P. A. Black

HARRISBURG, Pa., June 10 .- Judge Samel W. Pennypacker of Philadelphia likely will be the nominee for governor of the republican state convention tomorrow. Ex-State Senator William M. Brown of New Castle will be nominated for lleutenant governor, and Major Isaac B. Brown of Erie will be the candidate for secretary of internal affairs.

Reduction of Two and a Half Million Acres Estimated in Spring Crop.

Nebraska Shows Three Hundred and Forty Thousand Acres Less, Due to Yielding of Spring to Winter Wheat.

WASHINGTON, June 10 -- Preliminary reports of the spring wheat acreage indicate a reduction of about 2,51.,000 acres, or 12.8 per cent. Of the nineteen states reporting spring wheat, thirteen report a roduced acreage. Washington being the only state having 100,000 acres or upward in this product that reports an increase.




