SUDDEN TURN DISCOUNTS THE BULLETIN

Longed-For Hot Weather Comes with Unexpected Rush and Puts New Phase on Crop Situntion.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, June 10 .- (Special.)-The vagaries of Iowa weather at this time keeps the crop estimators guessing. This morning the thermometer took a sharp upturn and by noon was at 90 degrees. Two days ago there was actual danger of frost in this part of lows. The crop bureau has been compelled to admit that conditions are becoming very bad for the farmers in Iowa. The report for last week, issued this morning, makes the following statement of the situation:
